Leland H Harvie, who is a descendant of the emigrant Harvie's who first came from Scotland to Rhode Island, and on to Nova Scotia in 1760.

Barbara Trott Bolton, a 2<sup>nd</sup> great grand-daughter of Andrew and Abigail, and a great-granddaughter of Rebecca Jane Harvie Murdock (1844-1939). (Please note: Barbara md Charles Bolton, who is no known relation our William Henry Bolton.)

Fran Lake Ostashek, a 2<sup>nd</sup> great-grand daughter of Andrew and Abigail, and the great-granddaughter of Leander Harvie (1836-1893).

Margaret (Peg) Summers Wilson, 2<sup>nd</sup> great-granddaughter of Andrew and Abigail, and great-granddaughter of Albert Edward Harvie (1841-1905)

The compiler, Elizabeth L. Nichols, is a 2<sup>nd</sup> great-granddaughter of Andrew and Abigail, and great-granddaughter of Elizabeth Harvey Bolton.

And to Michael Bolton, a grandson of Elizabeth Harvey Bolton, and son of Leander William Bolton (1871-1967).

Frieda (Alfredia) Stephenson (now deceased), granddaughter of Elizabeth Harvey Bolton and daughter of Frances (Fanny) Bolton Stephenson (1875-1959).

Eugene Bolton Powers (now deceased) and his brother Theodore (Ted) William Powers, grandsons of Elizabeth Harvey Bolton, and sons of Luella Bolton Powers (1869-1960).

Wilbur Judson Harvey (1906-1985), who helped me so much when I first began to gather information on the Harvie family. Wilbur and his wife Frances lived in Andover, Massachusetts. He was the son of Wilbur Judson (or Judson Wilbur) Harvey (1876-1931), who was son of Isaac Burgess

Harvie (1838-1913), son of Encom Harvie (1813-1869), son of Stephen Harvie (b 1874) md Esther Sanford, who was son of James Harvie (1746-abt 1784) and Alice Wilcox – see pedigree chart. Wilbur also goes back into the Wilcox pedigree through his ancestor Esther Sanford, wife of Stephen Harvie and through another Sanford line.

And others, especially those Harvie cousins who the compiler met on trips to Nova Scotia in the 1970s; in particular Robert Paton Harvey who hosted me and introduced me to so many other Harvie relatives.

Further, acknowledgement and appreciation must be expressed to those who have compiled and previously published information on our Harvie family, including three publications in particular:

From Old Scotia to New Scotia A family of Harveys: Tracing the Lines of Connection from the Past to the Present, by McLeod Harvey, Ph.D, D.D, with acknowledgments to my cousin Dr. Basil Harvey of Chicago University, and to my cousin Andrew Harvey of Newport for information they gathered, and the help of my daughter, Gertrude, for arranging and typing the material

Elizabeth L. Nichols, the compiler of this present document, corresponded with Gertrude Harvey for several years, and obtained additional information and some documents from her.

McLeod Harvey was born 3 July 1862 in Newport, Nova Scotia, son of William Harvie (1809-1883) and Margaret Miller; and grandson of James Harvie (1765-1850) who married his cousin Margaret Harvie (1768-1853). McLeod Harvey died 4 Dec 1846 of Waynesburg, Greene, Pennsylvania USA and Washington, DC.

His wife, Amy Archibald (1867-1951) was daughter of Ebenezer Erkine Archibald, and granddaughter of James D Archibald and Amy Harvie (1800-1871), and great-granddaughter of James Harvie (1765-1850) who married his cousin Margaret Harvie (1768-1853). (See pedigree chart in Part II.)

Basil Coleman Hyatt Harvey was born 16 Jan 1875 at Watford, Lambton, Ontario, son of Leander Harvey (1836-1893) and Annie Wilson, and grandson of Andrew Harvey (1794-1872) and Abigail Harvie (1806-1892). Basil Harvey died 15 Feb 1958, Chicago, Cook, Illinois, USA. Technically speaking, he was a first cousin once removed (1 c 1 r) to McLeod Harvey.

Elizabeth Nichols corresponded briefly with Basil Harvey a year or so before his death. Basil was well known to at least the older children of Elizabeth Harvey Bolton (Ernest and Lea). He was their first cousin once removed (meaning that one is one more generation removed from the common ancestor than the other).

Andrew Harvie of Newport, Nova Scotia ("cousin" to McLeod Harvey) was born 24 Feb 1856, in Newport, Hants, Nova Scotia, son of Stephen Harvie (1803-1895) and his wife Grace Johnson, and grandson of James Harvie (1765-1850) and his wife who was also his cousin, Margaret Harvie (1768-1853). Andrew was a first cousin to McLeod.

Andrews son, Morely Dimock Harvey, had the letters written by Andrew Harvey of Ontario to his brother Stephen Harvie in Nova Scotia, which are quoted in this document, and Morley shared copies of them with us. Elizabeth L. Nichols visited Morely Harvey in the 1970s, while in Nova Scotia.

While this work, *From Old Scotia to New Scotia: A Family of Harveys* from information compiled in the 1920s, is a wonderful foundation and we owe a great debt of gratitude to those who preserved it, it does contain some errors and some omissions (as some descendants have proven).

John Harvie (1730-1822) of Newport, Nova Scotia: Three Generations of Descendants by Robert Paton Harvey, published first in *The Nova Scotia Historical Quarterly*, vol 6, no, 4, Dec 1976; and re-published later as a separate document.

Robert Paton Harvey responded in the 1960s to an advertisement in the newspaper placed there by Elizabeth L. Nichols for information on the Harvey family of Nova Scotia and Scotland; and has contributed much to the study of the family. Robert and his wife Carollyn and his parents hosted me when I visited Nova Scotia in the 1970s, and took me to visit many older relatives to gather further information from them, to visit cemeteries, archives, etc.

Since he is still living, we will say only that Robert is son of Charles Herbert Harvey (1896-1988) & Margaret McPherson; grandson of Walter J Scott Harvie (1872-1941); great-grandson of William Johnson Harvie (1843-1916); 2<sup>nd</sup> great-grandson of Stephen Harvie (1803-1895); and 3<sup>rd</sup> great-grandson of James Harvie (1765-1850) who married his cousin Margaret Harvie (1768-1853). See pedigree charts and family groups in part II.

The Harvie /Harvey Family of Hants Co. Nova Scotia by Leland H Harvie, copyright 1984 by Leland H Harvie, and published in Nova Scotia.

Leland Harold Harvie is still living, and is referenced earlier in this appreciation. He and I have known each other since the late 1970s when I first received a long-distance telephone call from him, and have shared our interest in our Harvie genealogy and in other lines. He is **son of John**Leland Harvie and Evelyn Rose Hart; **grandson of Leland Benjamin**Harvie (1894-1960); **great-grandson of Edmund Leland Harvie** (1863-1934); **2**<sup>nd</sup> **great-grandson of Nicholas Leland Harvie** (1831-1910); **3**<sup>rd</sup> **great-grandson of Archibald Harvie** (abt 1805 1839) who married a cousin Margaret Harvie (1810-1902) daughter of John Harvie (abt 1772-) who was son of Archibald Harvie and Amy Mosher, who was son of James Harvie I (1710-1792) (see pedigree chart in Part II);

and back to Margaret's husband Archibald Harvie who was born abt 1805, he was son of James Harvie (1773-1834) who married a cousin Martha Harvie (1772-1861) who was daughter of John Harvie (1730-1822) [see pedigree chart in Part II]; and back to Martha's husband, James Harvie 1773-1834 was son of James Harvie (1746,) who married Alice Wilcox (see pedigree chart in Part II).

[The bold is the paternal line back; the others are where another Harvie descent is also found through the mother.]

And Jessie Murdock Gilmore, who wrote what she called a history of her mother and her mother's brothers and sisters, but seems upon close examination to be more historical fiction. However, since parts of it do appear to be based on family tradition and/or about people that she did grow up with and things which do not disagree with known facts, I have included some of this and wish to acknowledge her contribution.

Jessie Ann Murdock (1874-1948) is the daughter of Rebecca Jane Harvey (1844-1939) and William Murdock; and the granddaughter of Andrew and Abigail Harvey.

This present (2010) Harvey /Harvie history is compiled by Elizabeth L. Nichols (ELN), primarily for the descendants of Elizabeth Hunter Harvey Bolton, and shared with others who have an interest- especially other descendants of Andrew and Abigail Harvey / Harvie. It is hoped that it will increase our appreciation for these ancestors, and provide a solid foundation upon which others can build to learn more of our ancestry. No work that was ever published is perfect, and I acknowledge that there will undoubtedly be errors in this. However, it is based on careful research. I hope you enjoy it.

#### HARVIE FAMILY BACKGROUND

In the 1600s in the area of Dalry, Ayrshire, in old Scotland, there was a Harvie family who had at least two sons: Andrew Harvie born abt 1698 who married Janet Speir (sometimes written as Spare in the surviving letters from Scotland to Nova Scotia), and was of Highlees, Dalry, Ayr, Scotland; and his younger brother James Harvie, born about 1710, who married Margaret Boyle and was of Dogartland, Dalry, Ayr, Scotland. These two brothers both had children christened and recorded in the parish register of Dalry, Ayr, Scotland.

James Harvie, the younger of these two sons, took his wife Margaret, and two of his sons, Archibald and James [Jr], and a daughter Margaret or Marion, and sailed to the new world. No record has yet been found of this voyage, but it is said they lived briefly in Rhode Island, USA, before going on to Nova Scotia [Canada]. They sailed on the Sloop Sally in 1760.

James Harvie left in Scotland at least one son, named John Harvie (chr 1738 in Dalry); but he brought with him in addition to his own sons, one nephew (son of his brother Andrew), who was also named John Harvie (chr 1730 in Dalry).

The descendants of these brothers and cousin intermarried, as was the custom of that day. James Harvie [Jr] (chr 16 May 1746 in Dalry, Scotland) married it is said 13 Nov 1768 in Hants County, Nova Scotia to Alice Wilcox, and became an ancestor to Elizabeth Harvey Bolton.

His cousin John Harvie (chr 30 May 1730 in Dalry, Scotland) married 27 Oct 1763 in Newport, Hants, Nova Scotia to Experience Powers of Rhode Island, and also became an ancestor of Elizabeth Harvey Bolton. For more details, please see the pedigree charts in the Part II.

Grandchildren of these early settlers, James Harvie (1765-1850), son of John and Experience (Powers) Harvie, and his cousin Margaret Harvie (1768-1853), daughter of James and Alice (Wilcox) Harvie, married and had 18 children, 17 of whom they raised to adulthood. Most of us go back in our pedigrees to this couple and from them to the earlier generations. See Part II for a photocopy of the Bible record showing these children, along with the family group record for the family and other documents and photos.





#### WHO THEY WERE AND WHERE THEY LIVED

**Elizabeth Hunter Harvey** was born in Hants County, Nova Scotia, Canada, 12 Sept 1846-- Elizabeth L Nichols (ELN), her descendant, has stood in the house where she is said to have been born, and has a picture of herself taken there in the 1970s (see Part II). Elizabeth H. Harvey Bolton is greatgrandmother to ELN, and great-grandmother to the next generation (add another great for their children).

Elizabeth Harvie / Harvey's parents' were first cousins, and her grandparents were second cousins. You will note that Abigail was the daughter of Andrew Harvie and married Andrew Harvie /Harvie (who was also her first cousin.

Elizabeth Harvey/ Harvie's father, Andrew Harvie, was born 1794 in Nova Scotia and died 1872 in Ontario; he was a son of James Harvie [1765-1850], who was the son of John Harvie born 1730 in Scotland and died in 1822 in Nov Scotia, and Experience Powers; and James' wife was Margaret Harvie [1768-1853], daughter of James Harvie born 1746 and his wife Alice Wilcox) – this James a first cousin to John Harvie b 1730;

and Elizabeth Harvey's mother was Abigail Harvie born Nov 1806 (daughter of Andrew Harvie who was born 1769 in Nova Scotia, son of John Harvie born 1730 in Scotland and died in 1822 in Nova Scotia and Experience Powers) and of Rebecca Lockhart; Elizabeth Harvey's father Andrew died 1872 in Nov Scotia.

The surname (last name) was spelled **Harvie** (Scottish spelling) in Nova Scotia and Scotland; Andrew and Abigail changed it to Harvey (more commonly the English spelling) when they moved from Nova Scotia to Ontario in 1848.

The following information is presented mostly in chronological order, using a variety of sources, including written histories where they contribute and letters and public records such as vital records, census records, etc. Copies of some of these documents are included.

# A CALENDAR OF EVENTS FOR ELIZABETH HARVEY BOLTON

First, it seems helpful to have a "Calendar of Events" for them -- showing where they lived and when, so we can know just where the records would be.

For Elizabeth H Harvie /Harvey [and including her parents, husband, and some on her eldest son, John Albert Ernest of A E Bolton], **beginning with her and her parents, Andrew and Abigail Harvey:**

#### STORY OF THE LIFE OF ELIZBETH HARVEY BOLTON

This begins using excerpts taken from the history of Rebecca Jane Harvey, written by Rebecca's daughter, Jessie Murdock. Rebecca Jane is an older sister to Elizabeth Harvey Bolton. (While her manuscript includes both fact and fiction, the excerpts have been limited mostly to what seems to be facts and traditions with some imagination, but supported by some other sources.)

"[Rebecca] lived in the sea-coast town of Windsor in Acadia where her father lectured on mathematics to the students who attended King's College....

"The sea shore was just down a shady road from Dr. Harvie's house, and there Rebecca Jane loved to go to play. She loved to paddle her toes when the blue Atlantic lay dimpling in the sun. The beach was productive of wonderful shells, pretty stones and abundant material for sand castles. When mother Harvie could take her little ones to enjoy an hour on the shore she romped with them in happy play. One day when they reached the shore Rebecca Jane explained:

'Oh, I can't play with the ocean today Mama; see he is angry and splashing, and hear him scold!'

'Yes, he is roaring today, but there is a great strong giant in the water. That is why it is never safe for you to come down here to play without an older person. That ocean giant could pick up my little girl in his great arms and I would never see her again.'

"Rebecca Jane looked at the tossing billows and shivered. 'I will never go near the ocean giant myself,' she said seriously. 'He is such fun sometimes, but I don't like him today.'

[Note: **This was in Nova Scotia**, and Rebecca Jane was only about four or five when they moved to Ontario; Rebecca was about 2 ½ years older than her younger sister Elizabeth [our ancestor], who was born in September 1846, and Rebecca Jane must have been about 4 when the following incident occurred.]

"One day Rebecca Jane was left to watch **baby Elizabeth** who was just beginning to toddle freely. Encouraging the little sister in her efforts, the little girl led her along the shady lane toward the beach, and was in the sand before the older child realized they were on forbidden ground. The baby was delighted with the new medium of play. She sat down to dig little holes with her feet and toss the sand in her fingers. Rebecca Jane brought shells and played house with her little charge until the first sense of uneasy disobedience was forgotten. The two little girls did not see the hungry arms of the slumbering giant stretching toward them until Rebecca Jane felt the lap of cold water about her feet. Baby Elizabeth was becoming tired and fretful. She wanted to rest while Rebecca Jane kept pulling her to her feet and urging her to hurry. The greedy tide was coming in slowing and relentlessly and Rebecca Jane was filled with cold terror.

"Rescue was at hand, however, for pounding hoofs came near, and a man's voice called: 'Run, little girl. I'll take the baby.' A bearded face bent down from the back of a horse and Baby Elizabeth was picked up and carried far up the shore beyond the creeping water.

'Now, then my dears, why are babies like you on the shore alone?" asked their rescuer. 'Where do you live? I will take you home.'

'It is my fault, sir,' answered a tired little voice. 'My name is Rebecca Jane Harvie, and this is my sister Elizabeth. I took her for a walk and we went too far. Our mother will be very grieved with me.'

'Well, you are safe now. Just don't tell her,' said the stranger with twinkle in his eye.

'Oh, I must tell my mother. I shall tell her how naughty I was and how you brought us home safely. I couldn't make Elizabeth go fast enough to run away from the giant. You really saved us from drowning.'

'Well, well,' exclaimed the stranger. 'Shall we go along home with this sleepy baby, and I shall take you back to your mother.'

"Rebecca's gentle mother [Abigail] received her little girls with profound gratitude, especially when the story tumbled out in excited phrases. Abigail Harvie was too thankful to utter a word of reproach. She folded the little ones in her arms and said simply:

'I have no words to express my gratitude.'

'Please do not thank me for so small a bit of trouble,' he replied. 'Thomas Boyd is my name, in the Land Survey Service of His Majesty's government. It is a pleasure to meet you and these charming tots. This little lass was plucky as could be. She did her best.'

'I was a very bad girl to forget, Mama, but I shan't forget again,' promised Rebecca Jane.

'No, I'm sure you will not,' her mother answered quietly.

'Will you not wait for our evening meal, sir? My husband will wish to give you his thanks when he knows this story,' asked Mrs. Harvie.

'Well, madam, I am going to the college to see about some matters for my work. If you will excuse me I hope to call upon Dr. Harvie yet today.'

'Why, this is delightful!' exclaimed Mrs. Harvie. 'You wish to see my husband on business. Could you not then share our supper and combine a little business with a visit?'

'Yes, please, sir, stay for tea and maybe we shall have muffins,' begged Rebecca Jane.

'Coincidence has brought us together and I shall be delighted to pursue our acquaintance further,' said Thomas Boyd courteously, and he stayed.

"The evening hours passed very pleasantly for the newcomer at the Harvie home. They found him a jovial Irishman with great faith in this new and unexplored land and tender love for the green fields of Erin. He was looking forward to the task of opening areas for the steady stream of settlers pushing inland from the Atlantic sea-board in search of new homes. The children were delighted with this new friend. He told them stories and taught them a funny little song, so that they were permitted to be up long after their usual bed time. Thomas Boyd felt grateful for this opportunity to know the Harvie family, not only because of the technical assistance he received from the mathematics master, but also because he valued personalities. Within the bosom of this quiet household he realized were lives that were contributing and would continue to contribute great things to the development of Canada. [NOTE: Rebecca Jane Harvey later married William Thomas Murdock, son of William Murdock and Anne Boyd; Anne Boyd was the daughter of this Thomas Boyd. For that branch of the family, this is significant. Comment from Elizabeth Nichols – obviously some imagination included, but it gives a picture that seems to be based in family tradition and some facts, and adds something not otherwise available to us.]

#### The move to Ontario

About 1848 when she was about two years old, Elizabeth Harvie with her family moved from Nova Scotia to Ontario – in those days, it was from

Nova Scotia to "Canada" as Nova Scotia was then a separate "country." This was when Andrew Harvey changed the spelling of his surname from Harvie to Harvey, though in official documents, such as a marriage record, some of the children are listed under Harvie.

# Andrew Harvie's Occupation

Let us insert here an explanation of what Andrew Harvie, her father, was doing in Nova Scotia, as explained by a descendant of Rebecca Jane in a letter to Elizabeth Nichols in December 1997 from M. Elizabeth Gilmore, Stratford, Ontario, Canada:

"When Andrew and Abigail Harvey were in Nova Scotia, he was a qualified land surveyor (PLS) but also a professor of mathematics at King's College in Windsor, Nova Scotia. He came to Ontario at the invitation of Egerton Reyerson Ontario's first Minister of Education. He invited Andrew to become an inspector and superintendent of schools in Norfolk County."

(Note from Elizabeth Nichols: this fits quite closely with what his daughter Elizabeth Harvey Bolton told her family in Iowa, USA.)

From published records, we find this--

In the biography for Andrew Harvey's sons, in Men of Canada (pages 65 for Leander Harvey, M.D., and p 46 for A. E. Harvey, M.D. Albert Edward.) it says [for both sons] that "His father Andrew Harvie, P.L.S., superintendent of public schools, and his mother Abigail Harvey, are referred to elsewhere in this volume." [We could not find them elsewhere. Andrew does not have an entry of his own, the reference is to several paragraphs at the beginning of the biography for the other son A.E. Harvey.] [Andrew Harvey] B.A., P.L.S., was also a native of Hants County, and practices his profession both in Nova Scotia and afterwards in Norfolk County Ontario where he removed in 1851, and where for sometime he acted as superintendent of public schools. At his own expense he put the Ten Commandments in tablet form, into all the schools of his county, and the Rev. Dr. Reyerson, upon his suggestion, had them introduced into all Canadian public schools. He was a staunch Presbyterian, a profound scholar, a life long Reformer and a man of upright Christian character. His wife, Abigail Harvey, was a very estimable woman. She died in 1892, having survived her husband nearly 20 years."

[See later in this document for more information about Leander and Albert Edward Harvey]

Now, returning to the Elizabeth Harvey Bolton's family – her parents and brothers and sisters at the time of this move in 1848:

- (Children of Andrew Harvey (1794-1872) and his wife who was also his cousin, Abigail (Harvie) (1806-1892): Ages refer to when they moved from Nova Scotia to Ontario, based on a letter from their father written in 1858 to his brother in Nova Scotia; the letter details the age of each child. The 1851 census also states that Enoch was the only child born in "Canada" meaning Ontario.
- 1] Eleanor, born 1827 in Nova Scotia, died 2 Dec 1893, who married James Parker in 1847 and later married George Mitchell before 1864; (Age about 21 when the family moved from Nova Scotia to Ontario in about 1848.)
- 2] **Sarah** born 1832 died 12 Jan 1855; (**Age about 16** when the family moved from Nova Scotia to Ontario about 1848)
- **3] Leander**, born 1 June 1836 in Nova Scotia, died 24 Dec 1893; (**Age about 12** when the family moved from Nova Scotia to Ontario about 1848.)
- **4] Albert Edward**, born Nov 1841 in Nova Scotia, died 1905; (**Age about 7** when the family moved from Nova Scotia to Ontario about 1848.)
- **5] Rebecca Jane**, born Apr 1844 in Nova Scotia, died 28 Apr 1939; (**Age about 6** when the family moved from Nova Scotia to Ontario about 1848)
- **6] Elizabeth**, born 12 Sept 1846 in Nova Scotia, died 17 Oct 1919 in Iowa; (**Age about 2** when the family moved from Nova Scotia to Ontario about 1848)
- **7] Enoch**, born Nov 1849 in Ontario, Canada, died 14 Sept 1920 in Michigan USA; (not yet born in 1848 when the family moved to Ontario).

#### The 1851 Census of Ontario, Canada

The 1851 census for Houghton Twp, Ontario, Canada, dated 1852, page 27 (FHL film 349227 (1851 census) lists the family:

Andrew Harvey, farmer, born Nova Scotia, Presbyterian religion, age 58

Abigail Harvey, [his wife] born Nova Scotia, Presbyterian, age 45

Sarah A. Harvey, born Nova Scotia, ditto on religion, age 20

Albert E. Harvey, ditto on birth place (Nova Scotia) and religion, age 9


Rebecca J. Harvey, ditto on birth place (Nova Scotia) and religion, age 7

Elizabeth Harvey, ditto on birth place (Nova Scotia) and religion, age 5

Enoch Harvey, born CANADA; ditto of religion, age 2

(Note that the daughter Eleanor and the son Leander are not listed in the household when this census was taken; they lived elsewhere at that time.)

Note that politically, Ontario was part of Canada at this time; Nova Scotia was not yet part of Canada.

Excerpts from the 1858 Letter from Andrew Harvey to his brother Stephen Harvie

Following are some excerpts of a letter written in 1858 by Andrew Harvey (1794-1872), father of Elizabeth Harvey (our ancestor) who had moved to Ontario; written to his brother Stephen Harvie who remained in Nova Scotia. The letter in full can be found in the Part II of this document.

# Houghton, May 16th, 1858 [Ontario, Canada] My dear brother:

I received your very affecinate letter after a passage of 11 days, it is a great treat to receive letters from our brothers and friends in our native town. We rejoice that you are all well. ... We are all enjoying the blessings of God in good health. **Leander** was married shortly after William left here; he is still teaching school in the place where he taught while William was here. Albert has grown a tall stout boy, he is now as tall as I am, he was 16 last November. **Rebecca** is 14 years old this spring, she is nearly as tall as her mother. She attended school regularly in our neighborhood the last three months, and the winter before she went to Leander's school. She is now quite a clever scholar, she has worked through the Arithmetic, and has made considerable progress in Algebra. **Elizabeth** is a fine healthy little curly headed girl, she will be 12 years old next September. **Enoch** will be nine years old next November. He is a healthy promising little fellow. ... ....I am not sorry I came to Canada, although you have many valuable privileges in Nova Scotia that we have not in Canada. Our lot is now cast in a noble land (see his history for more of this; when it gets typed in there). [he speaks of buying more land, "this place is near George Mitchel's, Eleanor' husband....


"... Tell our Brothers and Sisters and all our friends to be in earnest in striving to walk in that narrow path that leads to life eternal that if we should never meet again upon earth, we may one day "meet in that house not made with hands in the Heavens." Rest upon nothing short of an assurance of God's Love as is expressed in the Assembly's Catechism.... Remember us affectionately to our dear aged friend and father, Uncle Andrew and all his family. [note: that would be Abigail's father and Andrew's uncle]. Lorenzo brought us his likeness that was taken a few years since, it has been well taken, and he is pronounced by everyone that sees it to be a fine looking old man, he is now if he is living, 89 years of age. ...

"Abigail and all the family joins with me in love to you and all yours. From your affectionate Brother, [signed] **Andrew Harvey.**"

# The 1861 census of Ontario, Canada

The **1861 Census** for Canada lists the family: living in Houghton, Norfolk, Ontario Canada:

Andrew Harvey, farmer, born Nova Scotia, age 68 born bt 1793 Abigail Harvey, [wife] born Nova Scotia, age 54 Albert Harvey, laborer, born Nova Scotia, age 25 Rebecka Harvey, school teacher, born Nova Scotia, age 17 Elizabeth Harvey, born Nova Scotia, age 15 Enoch Harvey, born Nova Scotia, age 12

Excerpts from the 1864 letter from Andrew Harvey to his brother Stephen Harvie

Following are excerpts of a second letter written by Andrew Harvey in Ontario to his brother Stephen Harvie in Nova Scotia describe his children at this time. It is dated Houghton [Ontario, Canada], March 3rd, 1864. The full letter can be found in the Part II of this document.

#### My Dear Brother and Sister:

... We are all well and I may say without boasting in comfortable circumstances. I hope and trust that you likewise are all enjoying God's blessings in good health. **Eleanor and her husband** [Dr. George Mitchell] are both well and doing well, they still live about two miles from our place, they have no children. They met with considerable loss last spring, they had a nice flock of sheep and had them all killed by the dogs but 2 they keep a good span of horses, 4 cows, and 3 or 4 young cattle, and they live very happily.

"Leander was 27 years old of last June, he has been married six years, he has 2 sweet little children, a girl and a boy. He has taught school the greater part of the time since he was 16 years of age, he taught the 3 last years at a village called Fredericksburg, about as large a place as Windsor was when we left Nova Scotia. He was encouraged by a Medical Gentleman who resided there to consider the study of medicine for a doctor, accordingly he took lessons under him for three years after school hours, and liked the study so well that he has made up his mind to pursue it, if his health is spared till he finishes his education for a doctor. He went to Ann Arbor College (Michigan, USA) last October, and expects to continue there till next spring, when he will again return to Canada. He will remain in Canada during the summer, and return again to College next winter.

"Albert is now 22 years of age, he is about 2 inches taller than I am and is stout in proportion, he has engaged to teach school this winter in this township about 6 or 7 miles from our place, he gets \$20 per month, and pay \$6 per month for his board.

"Rebecca will be 20 years of age next April, she was married last winter to a man by the name of William Murdock, she taught school the most of the summer months since she was 16 years of age, they live about 75 miles west of us. Abigail [Andrew's wife], Enoch, (our youngest boy) and I made them a visit last October. William Murdock owns a splendid farm and is very respectable man, he is about 27 years of age, he raised last summer over 800 gushes of wheat, he has been for several years one of the Municipal Council for the Township of Adelaid. They made us a visit about the first of

Jany and Elizabeth (Harvey) went home with them, and expects to stay with them during the winter go to school. Rebecca is about such a sized person as her mother was when she was of her age, and looks as her mother did.

**Elizabeth was 17** years of age last November. She is rather taller than her Mother or Rebecca and often reminds me of some of my sisters when they were young. [Our ancestor]

We have a small family this winter, only Enoch is with us at present. **Enoch is a fine manly boy 14 years** of age last November. He is going to school at home this winter he is getting along pretty well in his learning he is pretty well posted in English Grammar, Geography, and Arithmetic, he is now in Vulgar Fractions in Arithmetic ...

(He speaks of the Presbyterian ministers both in Nova Scotia and near where he lives, etc.)

"We keep up the good old practice of holding family worship every day, upon these occasions, I require some of the members of the family to read a portion of God's word with me. This practice I think has been a blessing to my family, it has not only had a good effect in teaching them to read but it has given them a knowledge of the scriptures.

....Give our love to Grace and all the members of your family. From your affectionate brother, (signed) **Andrew Harvey** 

# The Marriage of Elizabeth H. Harvey

Elizabeth Harvey married 27 December 1865 to William Henry Bolton, son of Richard Bolton and Frances White who had migrated from County Wexford, Ireland, to Ontario, Canada about 1840. William Henry Bolton, born 1841, was the first of his parents' children born in Ontario, Canada; the older ones were born in Ireland. William Henry Bolton and Elizabeth Hunter Harvey were married in the Harvey home in Ontario.

Elizabeth met her husband while she was visiting her sister, Rebecca; the Bolton's are from the same area in Ontario where Rebecca and her husband lived, and their father tells of Elizabeth going to visit Rebecca there.

A transcript of the marriage license; township boundaries, county names and place names changed over time in Ontario just like everywhere else:

The 1871 Census of Ontario, Canada

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The **1871 census** lists the family with Andrew age 74, and Abigail age 69, and only one child still home and he is married. They were living in Houghton, Norfolk South, Ontario, Canada:

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Note: Our people lived in Oxford township, Oxford County, Ontario, Canada.

Places can be confusing: in Canada, there is an Oxford, Ontario--but there is a county of Oxford, and there is a township in another county (Greenville). Oxford county--where ours are from would be next to Norfolk county, and Oxford county was not created until 1808; the Greenville county is over near Quebec and was created in 1792; Oxford county has Oxford township--east, west and north! (It is also near Waterloo and Wellington, and Norfolk--all places associated with our Ontario Bolton and Harvey families.)

Further: Canada West, sometimes referred to as C.W or Canada English is Ontario; and Canada East (C.E.) is Quebec, also called Lower Canada. Our Harvey's and Bolton's settled in Ontario or Canada West.


# Death Records of for Andrew Harvey


**Andrew Harvey died in 1872**, in Ontario, Canada. We have both a photocopy of the original death record, and a death certificate for him:

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The death of Andrew Harvey is recorded in the middle column of the left-hand page in the upper section.

The death certificate for Andrew Harvey in 1872, followed by the death certificate for his wife Abigail Harvey in 1892 (20 years later). Both certificates are from Ontario, Canada.





# Elizabeth (Harvey) and William Henry Bolton Move to USA

Elizabeth (Harvey) and William Henry Bolton lived in Strathroy, Middlesex County, Ontario, Canada, until about 1876, when they went by covered wagon to Iowa, USA. Their oldest son, John Albert Ernest Bolton (called Ernest or A. E.) was born in 1867 and said he was about nine years of age when they made that trip to Iowa. They homesteaded in Iowa. Ernest Bolton is ancestor to Elizabeth Nichols. His brother Leander (called Lea), born in December 1870, said he was about 5 years old when they made the trip, and that also fits to be about 1876.

The 1900 census in Iowa gives their emigration date as 1876, though some other census records give various years (they seem to have forgotten as time went on exactly when they did move to Iowa).

The 1917 Greene County Atlas (Iowa), is in possession of Mike Bolton, says the year that the Bolton Family came to Greene County was 1876. Mike says "Any contributor to the Atlas could contribute any picture, or 'Farm Name' that they liked, so that information is far from 'Official'. It is, however, information as submitted by the Bolton Family. The name of the farm as stated in the Atlas is: 'Seven Oaks'. Myrtle Bolton also contributed a picture of a family get-together in which William, Elizabeth and, apparently, all the children are casually posed in front of the Cedar Township farm house."

# The Indian Sewing Basket

This Indian basket the Bolton's brought with them to America [the USA] when they came from Canada in 1876. It's a small sewing basket, about 3" X 5", with a lid, and made of Birch Bark, with decorations of colored Porcupine Quills. "I'm told, it was traded from the Indians of the area of Canada from which they originated, (probably Chippewa or Huron), for an excess of flour that

the Boltons' had in their possession. The amount of Flour, I believe, was 100 pounds. (Description from Mike Bolton, who has the basket.)



Elizabeth Harvey Bolton and her husband William Henry Bolton homesteaded in Iowa, where they lived on a farm and raised a family of 8 children (the first five were born in Ontario, Canada; the last three in Iowa USA). Their first home was typical of its time. Here is a picture of the home a little later in time.



## Descriptions of Elizabeth Harvey Bolton

Elizabeth Harvey Bolton's oldest son, our ancestor John Albert Ernest Bolton, said that his mother had auburn hair that fell in ringlets about her face. She used to curl it on her fingers.

Her granddaughter, **Besse Luella Bolton Nichols**, 1899-1989 [mother to Elizabeth L Nichols], recorded that when she was a child she used to love to go over to be with her grandparents, and spent a lot of time with both sets of her grandparents. "They would come and visit us on a Sunday and they would ask me to go home with them. Mother [Effie Deweese Bolton] would often let me go, depending on circumstances--really it would depend on whether I had enough clean dresses right then." (Besse says they wore cotton dresses, knee length until they were teenagers, when the dresses were lengthened to the floor, which she did not like.)

"Grandpa and Grandma Bolton's address at that time was Scranton, Iowa. Grandpa's name was William Henry Bolton, and Grandmother's name was Elizabeth Harvey Bolton. Grandpa wore a beard, which was white. Grandmother wore her hair in curls, which she curled on her fingers.

This Granddaughter Besse said "I loved to go with Grandpa out into the fields and into the woods. He had so much patience with me and seemed delighted that I liked to go with him. Sometimes we would go get the cows for the evening milking, or sometimes we would just go for a walk in the woods.

"Grandpa Bolton was of medium height, not a large man at all. Grandma Bolton was a good-sized woman, about the same height as Grandpa was.

"We would go in the "surrey with the fringe on top" just as you hear about, when we went to our Grandparents. It was a sort of buggy and sort of spring wagon, I guess; it had two seats in it, and springs, and a top, with a fringe; and Dad drove two black mares, which were so pretty.

"Uncle Lea [Leander William Bolton, brother to our Grandpa John Albert Ernest Bolton] was still living at home when I used to visit Grandpa and Grandma Bolton. He did not marry until very late in life. He was what we called an old bachelor. I loved Uncle Lea because he would take me places with him and answer my questions-- which were many. He had so much patience with me.

"Talking about this brings back precious, precious, memories." (On a tape recorded in 1985 by Besse Luella Bolton Nichols, interviewed by her daughter, Elizabeth L. Nichols.)

Elizabeth, wife, born Sept 1845, age 54, md 35 years; mother of 8 children and all 8 living; born Canada- English; father and mother both born Canada - Eng; emigrated 1874, been in US 24 years (does NOT indicate Naturalized); can read, write, and speak English

Leander W, son, born Dec 1870, age 29, single, born Canada - Eng; both parents born Canada Eng; **emigrated 1876**, been here 24 years; naturalized; farmer; can read, write, and speak English

Note that John Albert Ernest Bolton and Effie Mae Deweese were married in 1893, so John or Albert or Ernest (he was in various records as each of the three given names) was not listed in his parents' home in 1900.

1910 US Federal Census for the State of Iowa, living in Cedar, Greene County, Iowa:

**Bolton, Leander W, son** age 39, single, born Canada English, father born Canada English; mother birth place marked thru—apparently said Nova Scotia and written over with Canada; emigrated 1876, naturalized **Bolton, Myrtle E, daughter**, age 26, single born Iowa, father born Canada English, mother birth place marked thru—you can see on that it had said Nova Scotia and they wrote over it "Canada" [note she is in some records as Eunice which is her middle given name]




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1910 federal census of the state of Iowa, USA, Carroll County, Glidden

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Death of Elizabeth Harvey Bolton

Elizabeth Harvey Bolton died in 1919 in Iowa, USA. Her obituary says:

#### Obituary of Elizabeth Harvey Bolton:

#### Mrs. W. H. BOLTON

Elizabeth H. Harvey was born at Newport, Nova Scotia, September 12, 1846, and died at Churdan, Iowa October 17, 1919, aged 73 years 1 month and 5 days. While yet a small child she came with her parents to Norfolk County, Ontario, where she grew to womanhood and was united in marriage to W. H. Bolton, on Dec. 27, 1865, and her death is the first break in the family circle founded at that time. To them were born eight children. Albert E., of Glidden, Iowa; Mrs. T. E. Powers, of Stillwater, Oklahoma; Leander, of Churdan [Iowa]; Harvey, of Regan, North Dakota; Mrs. J. H. Stephenson and Mrs. M. F. Sayre of Churdan [Iowa]; Myrtle E. and Franklin who were at home with their parents. All of whom were present and are sorrowing from the loss of a loving and devoted Christian mother. She also counted as her jewels, twenty grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. And is also survived by one sister, Mrs. Murdock, of London, Ontario, and one brother, Enoch Harvey, of Bentley, Michigan. In 1876 she with her husband and the five older children came to Iowa, locating at Scranton, Greene County, enduring the inconveniences incident to the development of a new country. She early united with the Methodist church, and although often unable to attend its services, lived her religion in a life of sacrifice to the welfare of others, believing in this as her Master's

will. Besides those bound by kindred ties, she leaves a host of friends who will ever remember her for her noble traits of character. The funeral services were held Monday afternoon at the M. E. Church conducted by Rev. J. F. Davis, and the remains were laid to rest in the beautiful Churdan cemetery.



## ADDITIONAL INFORMATION OF INTEREST

## **Triplet Cousins**

Elizabeth Harvey Bolton was born in 1846, and her uncle and his wife had triplets born that same year. This was before the days of bottles, and the mother of the triplets did not have enough milk for her three babies. So the two mothers nursed the four babies – the two mothers were Abigail Harvie and Mary K Archibald Harvie, wife of "Uncle George Harvie" b 1806.

The triplets (Frederick, William, and Mary Harvey, all born 5 Nov 1846) all also migrated to the US. The boys were made judges the same year, one in Oklahoma and one in Minnesota; the girl married a farmer. I think in Iowa. William married Kitty Bonham in 1879. When William went into Oklahoma, he would not take his wife Kitty with him because she was too frail. But he died in 1900 at the age of only 54; and Kitty lived to be 112, dying in 1972. Elizabeth L Nichols first came in contact with that fact when researching the family back in the 1970s. And since William served in the Civil War, I wanted access to his US Civil War record, and his records were restricted. I wanted to know why, and made an appointment at the Federal Building to find out why. I learned that his widow had died so recently that

the records were still classified as private (but I was allowed to see them). Kitty Bonham Harvey had written her history, excerpts of which was published in an Oklahoma periodical- *Chronicles of Oklahoma*, vol 35, 1957-8, titled "Memoirs of Oklahoma by Kittie M Harvey" pages 41-52. The entire manuscript which she wrote at the age of 95 was placed in the Oklahoma Historical Society. There are no descendants of the two boys, though one of them adopted a step-son. I do not know whether the step-son took the name of Harvey. Their own children died without issue- mostly in childhood.

#### Keepsakes from Aunt Luella

Luella Bolton Powers was a sister to grandfather of the compiler of this record. And the name of Luella is carried by both my mother, her niece (Besse Luella Bolton Nichols), myself, Elizabeth Luella Nichols. Aunt Luella wrote to me in about 1947. She sent to me three items that were hers... one was her childhood thimble, another was a ring that my grandfather, her brother, had given to her many years before; and the third was another ring that I don't think she ever stated what was, but my mother thought it was Aunt Luella's first wedding ring (she was a widow at this time). This was about the time that Aunt Luella married her second husband, Herman S Collins, in Oklahoma. We were living in North Carolina at the time. I was still a little girl. I still have these three items, and they are still in the little dark blue glass container that she sent to me that contained them.

## Old Stephenson Home

"Aunt Fanny" (Frances Elizabeth Bolton Stephenson) married and had two children – one died as a young man, and the other never married. They later adopted Doris, who brought a lot of happiness to them. This photo of their home, so different from many homes in the mid-west during this period, seems appropriate to include here. The people are Henry Stephenson, Fanny,



Frieda, and Elvin at their home in Churdan, Iowa.

## More Details about the Brothers and Sisters of Elizabeth Harvey Bolton

Now, let us look more at the history of the brothers and sisters of Elizabeth Harvey Bolton (while some information on them is given earlier, this enhances it.

[First, from the history of Elizabeth's sister, Rebecca Jane, written by her daughter Jessie Murdock Gilmore, which includes family tradition and use of her own imagination and some facts]:

"Rebecca Jane was pulling her small sister, in a little cart, along the path near the house one day when she saw a tall gentleman passing by. She was so excited she ran toward him calling "Mr. Boyd, Mr. Boyd. Oh, I'm so glad to see you.. and sure enough it was Thomas Boyd, looking in amazement at the little girls. "If it isn't the lassies from Nova Scotia! How did you get here?"... Tom Boyd was glad to find such friends again, and particularly gratified to know that such a scholar as Dr. Harvie was to set up standards of public school education in this new county. Tom Boyd profited by Dr. Harvie's great mathematical knowledge. Dr. Harvie learned of the needs of the pioneer from this land surveyor."

"Rebecca Jane had three older brothers of whom she was very fond. [note by ELN: this is a mistake; she had two older brothers (Albert Edward and Leander) and one younger brother (Enoch).] "That doesn't mean that she was always a sweet and agreeable little sister. She could irritate and even anger them frequently by interfering with their plans or demanding some of their playthings. In fact, as her mother said, Rebecca Jane would have made a good boy, for she loved noisy games and the amusements of her brothers far more than the times she spent with her dolls or her little work-basket.

"Of the three, Rebecca Jane loved Albert most. He was big and ungainly, with a loud voice and hearty laugh. He would roar at her or even slap her with his big hand if she annoyed him too much, but Rebecca Jane knew that those same big hands were wonderfully skillful in binding a cut finger or scratched knee, and that rough voice could be very tender if his sympathy was aroused. Albert made a hobby of pets and people. He was always bringing home a stray kitten or a wounded bird so that the stable at the back of the Harvie home was never without an assortment of little creatures who came to Albert for food and care. Then he liked to sit on the fence to talk with the gardener, or to mend nets on the shore with the fishermen. People liked this boy and his increased in knowledge of human nature by his love of visiting.

[Note from ELN: while this description is written by a niece from the memory of his younger sister Rebecca Jane, note that his sister Elizabeth named her first son John Albert Ernest Bolton--who was our ancestor. Apparently the name Albert came from this older brother – as well as from Prince Albert in England; it is said that the mother said the name the Queen of England gave her son must be a special name, so she also named her son Albert—or so family tradition says. That is supposed to refer to the first Albert in our Harvie/ Harvey family. Albert Edward Harvey became a medical doctor.]

"Leander was a student, a shy, pale lad whose complete happiness lay in the library of their home. If his mother suggested that he might read to his little sisters, he would shrug his thin shoulder impatiently and answer, 'When I was a child, I spake as a child, I understood as a child, and thought as a child; but now I have put away childish things." Mother Harvie never laughed at this, but she would answer gently, "Yes, dear, and if the girls are to grow in knowledge and understanding, you must help them." So with little appetite for the task, Leander read nursery rhymes or more often a Bible story. He had an insatiable thirst for knowledge himself, and his mother felt that she must find ways to keep him out of doors or at play for the sake of his eyes and his rapid growth."

[Note: his sister Elizabeth Harvey Bolton named her second son Leander William Bolton. Her brother, Leander Harvey, also became a medical doctor. ELN]

"Enoch was the quiet boy of the house and on him fell many of the household chores because he liked to chop wood and plant vegetables. [He was also the youngest child, born in 1849 after the family moved to Ontario.] He was always saving his money to buy a few nails to make things. Wherever he went he found some new plant to bring home to the garden. Rebecca Jane liked to dig in the soft earth and cover up little seeds so that she might have her own flowers to pick later on. She seldom annoyed Enoch for he was so good-natured with everyone.

[Note: Enoch went to Michigan for medical training, and met and married a girl there-though she was born in Ontario; and Enoch remained in the United States. He occasionally made visits to his sister Elizabeth Harvey Bolton who lived in Iowa, per his nephew Leander Bolton (Elizabeth Harvey Bolton's son); "Uncle Lea" as Leander Bolton was called and signed his

name, remembered meeting "Uncle Enoch" and had a picture of him which he shared years ago with the compiler of this work. (See page 8.) The 1920 census states that Enoch immigrated to USA in 1882, and was naturalized in 1891. These dates may or may not be correct.]

Returning to the history of Rebecca Jane Harvey Murdock:

"The years moved on, filled with activity and work, with purposeful living and happy associations too. Dr. Harvey found his duties arduous and progress slow, but he felt himself a part of a great new tide of betterment, and was dismayed by the apparent lack of results. He had the Ten Commandments put up on a scroll in each little school, for, as he said, "Except the Lord build a house they labor in vain that built it. [See Holy Bible---]. The teaching of morality held the highest place. Accuracy came next, and the boys and girls found keen pleasure in saying their tables with speed and correctness. Spelling matches were Friday afternoon diversions, and every school had its excellent spellers.

"The Harvey children acquitted themselves well in the classroom at Vienna. Leander went far beyond his classmates with his love of reading and facts acquired thereby. Albert felt that there should be some subject devoted to the study of animals and Enoch felt that plants and soils could have a place on the curriculum. That day of natural science was still to come. Rebecca Jane was like a bright little diamond in the school-room. She was quick, accurate, and a joy to teach.

"One day her father brought a visitor named Colonel Otter to call at the school. He offered a silver dollar for the best acrostic written from his name. In twenty minutes Rebecca Jane had been acclaimed the winner, for she wrote: "Only time turns everything right." Col. Otter praised the bright little girl for "a clever and profound statement" based on the letters of his name. This incident was indicative of her ability, and when she was sixteen she had taken all the examinations leading to a teacher's diploma.

[Note from ELN: The fact that Rebecca Jane was a tom-boy, and sharp and quick mentally, and liked to do things, along with the description of her looks reminds one very much of her grandniece, Besse Luella Bolton (Nichols), daughter of John Albert Ernest Bolton... and my mother.]

Returning now to the history of Rebecca Jane, written by her daughter:

"Then came a time of strenuous effort for this bright-eyed girl, [Rebecca Jane Harvey]. She taught school for six months of the year, and under the most difficult conditions. The classroom was crowded, poorly equipped and poorly lit, but the energetic little teacher brought order and system to bear

upon it was amazing results. She was so young and pretty, and it was only by great dignity that she would keep control of all the big boys who were older than she. Mother Harvie realized how hard the girl was working and she helped her in every way she could with tasty lunch boxes and an extra pair of stockings for the cold days. Dr. Harvey kept a watchful eye on Rebecca Jane's class. But he told her mother she was a brilliant success. He felt she was a born leader."

[This is compiler of the record talking; she is a daughter to Rebecca Jane Harvey Murdock - Jessie Murdock Gilbert] "In my mother's family were four sisters and three brothers. Sara, the oldest, had died before I was born, but my Aunt Eleanor, who was a veritable saint of a woman, I never liked when a child, although I revere her memory now. The reason I did not like her was because she cried so easily. Her lachrymose [?; I am sure it means sad] eyes worried me, also I hated to be pitied.

"Aunt Elizabeth [Harvey Bolton] was much the same\*, but my three uncles were so different.\*

[Note from ELN: \*Her "Aunt Elizabeth", moved from Ontario to Iowa, USA in 1876; since Jessie was born in 1874, she obviously had no knowledge or memory of this aunt at all; and this description does NOT fit her, and I have omitted most of it. It makes one question how correct any of her descriptions may have been. But she did know most of the others.]

"Uncle Enoch and Uncle Leander were great churchmen, always had family worship, morning and evening, asked a blessing at the beginning of a meal and returned thanks at the close. But they were so full of fun--always good jokes to laugh at and strong arms to give the children a toss in the air, a piggy-back ride or a ride to bamberry cross on their feet.

"My mother's other brother was a very different type. He was born on the same day as Queen Victoria's eldest son,. My grandmother told me that she waited to know the name that the Queen would give her boy and she named hers the same--Albert Edward. Like his brother Leander, he taught school, then studied medicine. Both young men graduated from Ann Arbor medical school [Michigan] then spent a year at Kingston as they wished to practice in Canada.

"Leander went to Watford and Albert started in Wyoming [Canada]. As they were but twelve miles apart, they often consulted over their cases.

"My Uncle Albert was known as a character. I would call him a man of strong personality. I shall tell you a few stories about him. My mother told me this one. It happened when he was 17.

"A neighbor's daughter was going to be married. She was such a good-looking capable girl, kind, too--far too good for Bill Piper, the man she had promised to marry. Bill was the only child of his widowed mother who had lived on the edge of poverty all her life to let Bill buy all the machinery or whatever else he needed, or thought he needed, to make farming easy. The house had no conveniences whatever, and in the kitchen was an old rusty, smoky stove. Mary had wanted a new one, but Bill said he could not afford it. It was good enough for his mother, it was good enough for Mary.

"Let us rid Mary of that old smoke-stack," said Albert to some of the neighbor boys, so that night when Bill was out, they entered his house, took the old junk and threw it in the river.

"Once he told us of a teen-age girl that caused her mother much worry. If the mother reproved her, Jane would fall on the floor. Then she was carried to her bed where she remained for several days. The doctor walked in after one of these spells. "Oh, Doctor," said the crazed mother, "can you help me?"

"Yes, I think so," he replied. Get me a poker. This is a spinal trouble. I shall heat this red hot and run it up and down the spine until it cools off. Now bare her back."

"He spoke in no uncertain tones--tones that carried to Jane's room. When he entered, she was up and defied him to touch her.

"Now, said he, "you have bugged your family long enough. Let this be the last!" and it was.

"A friend told me that she was returning by train from Toronto and was resting her hand beneath an open window. The window fell and her quivering fingers were caught in a tortoise vice. Many men jumped to help her. They tugged and pulled at the window. No result. My friend was becoming faint from pain. Someone went through the train calling for a doctor. From the next car came a tall, stalwart man. He took one look, lifted one big foot, and sent the window smashing to slivereens out on the tracks. My friend said she was so relieved physically and mentally, that all she could do was cry and almost neglected to thank her rescuer. When she did so, she inquired his name and he gave her his care -- "Dr. A. E. Harvey, Wyoming (Canada)."

"Well do I remember when Mrs. Brown lost her cow. The rent was due and the owner of the house was there for his money. She had sewed and worked hard, but had not made enough to meet the rent. The landlord would not wait, but said he would take the cow. What could she do without a cow?

Her four little children needed milk. How could she buy it? "Give me time," said she, "and I'll pay all in full."

"None of her pleadings were of any avail.

"The doctor drove up, saw the man, saw the cow, and sized up the situation at once. With a voice of thunder he ordered the man to put that cow where he got it. The man hesitated, whimpered a little about rent due him, whereupon my uncle paid him in full and told him to go home and make study of the prophets that denounced a man who would oppress a window.

"Let him who is greatest among you be the servant of all." Uncle Albert's name is engraved on a memorial window in the Presbyterian Church that he so faithfully attended and so liberally supported. It is the picture of Christ blessing the children. His glory is eternal in that community for he won the affection and the gratitude of honest folk. Yes, he produced an effect."

[Note from ELN: while this is not directly the history of our ancestor, Elizabeth Harvey Bolton, it seems appropriate to include, because it tells of her family-and will be of special interest to some who may have access to this booklet.]

## Biographies for Albert Edward and Leander Harvey

Biographies for Albert Edward Harvey and Leander Harvey sons of Andrew and Abigail and include their pictures. Pages 46 and 65 of a volume titled *Men of Canada*, no date. There are several paragraphs on Andrew's career as superintendent of public schools in Ontario included in the biography of Albert (cited earlier in this document).

## About Albert Edward Harvey, born Nov 1841:

Men of Canada, p 46, under A. E. Harvey, MD, of Wyoming, Ontario, was born in 1841, in Hants County, Nova Scotia. His father, Andrew Harvey, B. A., P.L.S, was also a native of Hants County and practiced his profession both in Nova Scotia and afterward in Norfolk county, Ontario, where he removed in 1851....[his mother was] Abigail Harvey, a very estimable woman who died in 1892, having survived her husband nearly 20 years. Dr Harvey, their son, received his primary education chiefly by private tuition of his father, during leisure hours, as he worked on the farm in summers, and in the lumber woods in winter. When 18 he began teaching school, and after 3 or 4 years entered Queen's University, Kingston, graduating M. D. in 1869. He then located in Wyoming [Canada], where he has practiced ever since.

He has been thrice married; first to Margaret, daughter of Robert Willis, of Norfolk, by whom he had two daughters;

then to Catherine, daughter of John McLeure, Esq., of Plympton township; and after her death to his second wife's sister, Jennie McLeure, by whom he has three children.

Dr. Harvey, in addition to his medical labors, carries on farming on an extensive scale, and also keeps a large dairy. Like his father before him, he is a staunch Reformer, secretary of the Wyoming Reform Association, and an out and out Free Trader. He is an adherent of the Presbyterian Church, also belongs to.... The doctor has been for years a prominent and influential member of the Wyoming [Canada] Board of Education and ... of the municipality."

#### For Leander Harvey:

Men of Canada, p 65

Leander Harvey, M.D., Watford, Ontario, was born June 1, 1836, at Newport, Nova Scotia. His father Andrew Harvey P.L.S., superintendent of public schools, and his mother Abigail Harvey, are referred to elsewhere in this volume. [not found]; Dr. Harvey began teaching when only 15 years old, and obtained (chiefly by private study) a first-class Teacher's Certificate, when 20. He taught school 11 years, after which he graduated M.D. from the University of Philadelphia and shortly after from the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons, Kingston, Ontario. In 1866 he located in Watford, where he has practiced ever since.

In politics Dr Harvey is a staunch Reformer, and in religion a Baptist.....he is also Corner for the County. The Doctor is a man of broad and liberal religious views, as is evinced by the warm esteem in which he is held by all creeds,. He attributes his position as a Christian to the influence, in his earlier years of his devoted mother, encouraged in later life by his excellent wife.

In 1857 he md Annie, youngest daughter of John Wilson, Esq., of Walsingham Township, whose prominent family history among the first pioneers of that county is widely know.

Dr Harvey has had eleven children, eight of whom passed infancy, viz: Sarah, afterward Mrs. Dr. Stanley who died in 1879; John Andrew, accidentally killed when five; Corydon Ford, druggist; Rodney, Ont; Lelia Maud, Fanny, Abigail, Leander Roy, and Wilfred W. P. High Schools Students, and Basil C. H., a third year student in arts, at Toronto University."

## Land in Ontario first purchased in 1844

Andrew was granted 100 acres from the Crown 14 Oct 1844, Lot No 18 in first concession, Township of Houghton, Ontario, according to the Archives of Ontario in Toronto. So he owned land there before he moved there 1848.

However, all records state that our Elizabeth H Harvey Bolton was born in Nova Scotia (in 1846)... including census records and others created by her father during his lifetime. So though he may have owned land in Ontario by 1844, he apparently did not occupy it until about 1848.

The family is found in Ontario by the time of the 1851 census. For those not aware of this: Please note... while the USA census was taken in 1840, 1850, 1860, etc; the Canadian census was taken in 1841, 1851, 1861, etc.

#### BRIEF INFORMATION ABOUT OUR BOLTON FAMILY

Elizabeth Hunter Harvey (1846-1919) married in 1865 in Ontario, Canada to William Henry Bolton, who was born 10 Mar 1841 in Oxford County, Ontario, Canada and died 18 July 1930 in Scranton, Greene, Iowa, USA.

William Henry Bolton was the son of Richard Bolton of County Wexford, Ireland, and his wife Frances P White also born Ireland who migrated to Ontario, Canada about 1840. This Richard and Frances (White) Bolton had four children born in Ireland, and three additional children born in Ontario, Canada. William Henry Bolton, born in 1841 was the first of their children born in Canada.

Richard and Frances (White) Bolton are found in the census records in Canada- we have copies of 1851, 1861, 1871, 1881 census; we have not yet found them in the 1841 census. The deaths of both Richard and Frances are found in the vital records; and records of their children are in various vital records; Richard and Frances are buried in what is known as the "4<sup>th</sup> Line Old Methodist Cemetery", in Adelaide, Middlesex, Ontario, Canada. Richard Bolton is said to have been from "County Wexford, Ireland" and it is said by his grandson that Richard returned to Ireland to sell land there a few years after he migrated to and settled in Ontario, Canada. Richard Bolton died 2 Aug 1876 in Strathroy, Middlesex, Ontario, Canada and his

age at death indicates that he was about abt 1797 in Ireland. It is said that his mother was a Miss Allen. His wife, Frances (White) Bolton, died 11 Nov 1884 in Brook twp, Lambton County, Ontario, Canada, and her tombstone lists her name as Frances P Bolton.

Their known children were: 1] Elizabeth (called Bessie) Bolton born 1 Oct 1828 in Ireland; md abt 1855 in Ontario to David Jury; and died 27 Sept 1916; 2] Isabella Bolton, born abt 1829 in Ireland, md 28 May 1857 in Ontario, Canada to Reverend John Shaw (death detail unknown). 3] Richard William Bolton, born abt 1837 in Ireland, never married, died 29 Oct 1909 and is buried near his parents. 4] Frances called Fannie Bolton was born abt 1839 in Ireland, never married, and died 9 Dec 1915 in Ontario, and is buried near her parents. 5] William Henry Bolton born 10 Mar 1841 in Oxford County, Ontario, Canada (the first child born in Canada), md 27 Dec 1865 in Houghton, Norfolk, Ontario, Canada to Elizabeth Hunter Harvie the daughter of Andrew and Abigail Harvey, and died 18 July 1930 in Scranton, Greene, Iowa USA. 6] Anna Marie Bolton was born abt 1843 in Ontario, Canada, md abt 1865 in Ontario to Edwin Wright, and died 8 July 1913. 7] John J. Bolton was born about 1845 in Ontario, md Mary, and went to California (his descendants have not been traced, though it is said that he did have sons).

It is interesting to note that in the 1871 census showing the family of our William Henry and Elizabeth (Harvey) Bolton (see page \_\_\_\_) there is a six year-old child listed named William Bolton, whose identity is unknown to us. He was born before the marriage of William Henry and Elizabeth; yet we have never heard of any previous marriage for William Henry. And there is nothing in family records pertaining to the child. The only record found so far is that 1871 census record.

Please note: Caution: there is known to be another Richard and Frances Bolton who were also from Ireland and settled in Ontario, Canada. They had 8 children, and five of their 8 children have the same given names as those of our Richard and Frances Bolton. In addition, they had a son William Henry Bolton who migrated to Iowa, USA. However, they are a different Bolton family. There is no known relationship between the two families, though there may be one. Elizabeth L. Nichols has corresponded with descendants of that family and is told that the maiden name of that Frances is Vail. They have a Bible record of their family (wish we did for ours!). #### Part II

## More about Our Harvie History

First are the letters written in 1858 and 1864 by Andrew Harvey (1794-1872) who had moved to Ontario, Canada and sent to his brother Stephen Harvie (1803-1895) who remained in Nova Scotia. In these letters, Andrew describes each of his children, gives their ages, and what they are doing. (Excerpts of these letters are found earlier in this document, in chronological order of events.) For photos of both Andrew and his wife Abigail, and of Stephen and his 2<sup>nd</sup> wife Grace, see page 61.

The second item are letters written from Scotland to Nova Scotia, by relatives of our John Harvie who migrated to Nova Scotia. These letters were written 1762-1819.

For the details of the christening records of John Harvie and his brothers who wrote to him, see the bottom of page 114.

Following the letters are the pedigree charts and family group records, with various explanatory notes or photographs following the family group for a specific couple. Then the descendancy chart for four generations of known descendants of Andrew and Abigail (Harvie) Harvie, the parents of Elizabeth Harvey Bolton.

To Stephen Harvie From Andrew

Houghton, May 16th, 1858.

My dear Brother

I received your very affectionate letter after a passage of 11 days, it is a great treat to receive letters from our brothers and friends in our native town. We rejoice that you are all well. We read with eagerness the great victories that have been achieved by the British forces in India, but they are not read by us with as much eagerness as a letter from a brother in Newport. We are all enjoying the blessings of God in good health. Leander was married shortly after William left here; He is still teaching school in the place where he taught while William was here. Albert has grown a tall stout boy, he is now as tall as I am, he was16 years old last Nov. Rebecca is 14 years old this spring, she is nearly as tall as her mother. She attended school regularly in our neighbourhood the last three months, and the winter before she went to Leander's school. She is now quite a clever scholar, she has worked through the XXX Arithmetic, and has made considerable progress in Algebra. Elizabeth is a gX fine Healthy little curly headed girl, she will be 12 years old next September, Enoch will be nine years old next Nov., he is a Mealthy promising little fellow. I should know you and Grace, but I do not think that I should know any of your dear children, It was sometime before I knew William when I first met him in Canada. If I am spared many years longer and God sees fit to prosper me so that I an afford the means, I think I shall visit the shores of N. Scotia again, I am not sorry I came to Canada, although you have many valuable privileges in Nova Scotia that we have not in Canada. Our lot is now cast in a noble land, How majestic her

waving forests! How fertile her soil! How bracing her climate! How rapid the strides she is making toward that enviable position, the first of all Nations! Here we are free from the enslaving claims of aristocracy on the one hand, and on the other, from the still more degrading despotism of the rabble. Here we have the stability of a Monarchy with the freedom of a republic -Kiberty without licentiousness - Progress without anarchy - Nova Scotians generally succeed well in Canada, they are trained to habits of industry and economy, Sobriety and Virtue - Those qualifications are absolutely necessary in order to be suffessfull in Canada. You mentioned in your letter that a Mr. Smith of Falmouth had a notion of coming to Canada to settle and wished to know what sortof farm he could purchase for 3 or 4 hundred pounds - in answer to these enquiries, I would say he can settle himself very comfortably at present with that sum, land is much cheaper than it was a year ago, owing to the scarcity of money and the low prices of produce. I bargained for a farm containing 100 acres in the township of Walsingham last year and engaged to give \$1500 dollars for it by the first of next Oct. I hold a bond for a deed when I make the payment. I have made about \$100 worth of improvements on it, and will sell my right for \$100 dollars more than I am to give for it, amounting in all to £400, this place is near George Mitchel's Eleanor's husband, there is about 40 acres of improvements on his place, and our Brother William will inform you as to the quality of the soil. If I do not make the payments for this land it will return to the hands of the man I bought it from, and in all probability, he will sell it under \$2000 dollars, for a Southern line of rail-road is going through this part of the country, and in all probability will run very near this place in Walsingham, and will enhance the value of

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real estate very naturally. I will either sell my right to the place in Walsingham or I will sell the place I am living on for £400 and will keep the place in Walsingham, for we will not be able to keep both without hiring the money, and money is now so scarce and the interest so high that it will not be prudent to hire the money. Woodbury and % his son, Loronso, have been heresince the Month of January, they expect now to settle themselves in Canada, they like it much better than the U nited States, they are both in good health and in good spirits. Statira expects to visit Nova Scotia this summer, she may be there as soon as this comes to hand. If Smith is made of the same kind of stuff that his father was made of, he will make a fortune in Canada. Ann, I think, is of the the right sort, she has been trained by an industrious and pious Mother, and I should rejoice to have such people as I think they are for neighbours. Miss Catherine Gould came to Canada some years ago and taught school about Port Burwell about three years. The Autumn of 1856, she returned to Nova Scotia, and stopped at Maitland about a year and has again returned to Canada, she made us a visit since she returned, she seems to like Canada better than Nova Scotia. She is now teaching school at Port Burwell. Give our love to Grace and all the children. Kiss little Andrew for me, remember us affectionately to all our Brothers and Sisters, to Mr. and Mrs. Johnson, to Mr. McKay and all the family, to the Misses Allisons, and the Misses Rathburnes. Tell our Brothers and Sisters and all our friends to be in earnest in striving to walk in that narrow path that leads to life eternal that if we should never meet again upon earth, we may one day "meet in that house not made with hands

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
in the Heavens". Rest upon nothing short of an assurance of God's Love as is expressed in the Assembly's Catechism, in answer to the question, "What are the benefits which in this Life accompany or flow from justification, adoption and Sanctification?". Remember us affectionately to our dear aged friend and Father, U nole Andrew and all his family. Lorenso brought us his likeness that was taken a few years since, it has been well taken, and he is pronounced by everyone that sees it to be a fine looking old man, he is now if he is living, 89 years of age. Please send us by any friend that is coming 2 or 3 Apple Potatoes if it is the right time of the year, likewise a little while rosebush, have it rolled up in a cloth with some moss around it. We have a fine garden, but I have not seen a white rose bush since we came to this country. It is now geting late and I must come to a close. Abigail and all the family joins with me in love to you and all yours.

Houghton, March 3rd, 1864.

My Dear Brother and Sister:

I have often thought lately of writing to every one of my Brown thers, but procrastination has hitherto kept me from putting my intentions in practice, but if I am spared a few weeks longer, I shall write to each of them, whom I have not written to heretofore I lately received two numbers of the Presbyterian Witness which I have reason to believe were sent by you, and which were received with gratitude, it is a good paper, second to none of the kind in British America, anything of the kind from Nova Scotia is very interesting to us. We are well and I amy say without boasting in km comfortable circumstances. I hope and trust that you likewise are all enjoying God's blessings in good health. Eleanor and her husband (Mr. George Mitchel) are both well and doing well, they still live about two miles from our place, they have no children. They met with considerable loss last spring, they had a nice flock of sheep, and had themm all killed by the dogs, but 2, they keep

a good span of horses, 4 cows, and 3 or 4 young cattle, and they live very happily. Leander was 27 years of age last June, he has been married 6 years, he has 2 sweet little children, a girl and a boy. He has taught School the greater part of the time since he was 16 years of age, he taught the 3 last years at a village called Frederickburg, about as large a place as Windsor was when we left Nova Scotia. He was encouraged by a Medical Gentleman who resided there to consider the study of Medicine for a doctor, accordingly he took lessons under him for three years, after School hours, and liked the study so well that he

has made up his kind to pursue it, if his health is spared till he finishes his education for a doctor. He went to Ann Arbor College (Michigan) last October, and expects to continue there till next spring, when he will again return to Canada. He will remain in Canada during the Summer, and return again to College next winter. Albert is now 22 years of age, he is about 2 inches taller than I am and is stout in proportion, he has engaged to teach School this winter in this township about 6 or 7 miles or from our place, he gets \$20 per month, and pay \$6 per month for his board. Rebecca will be 20 years of age next April, she was married last winter to a man by the name of William Murdock, she taught School the most of the summer months since she was 16 years of age, they live about 75 miles west of us. Abigail, Enoch (our youngest boy) and I made them a visit last October. Wm. Murdock owns a splendid farm, and is a very respectable man, he is about 27 years of age, he raised last summer over 800 bushels of wheat, he has been for several years one of the Municipal Council for the Township of Adelaid. They made us a visit about the first of Jany. and Elisabeth went home with them, and expects to stay with them during the winter and go to School. Rebecca is about such a sized person as her mother was when she was of her age, and looks as her mother did. Elisabeth was 17 years of age last Nov. she is rather taller than her Mother or Rebecca and often reminds me of some of my sisters when they were young. We have but a samall family this winter, only Enoch is with us at present. Enoch is a fine manly boy 14 years of age last Nov. he is going to school at home this winter he is getting along prettXy well in his learning he is pretty well posted in English Grammar, Geography and Arithmetic, he is now

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in Vulgar Fractions in Arithmetic. I am glad to hear that you have a settled Presbyterian Minister in Newport, and that he is a faithful man, he will not only be instrumental in promoting Religion among those who call themselves Presbyterians, but he will promote the common cause of Religion among all classes. I am sorry to hear that Mrk Murdock's health has failed so that he has been obliged to resign his charge of the congregation in Windsor. He has been a faithful shepherd, and her done a great deal to promote the cause of "eligion, both in Windsor and Newport, and I am glad to see by the Witness, that the Presbytery is dispossed to grant him a liber stipend. I am glad to hear that Arch and Job have joined the Church and are striving to walk in Wisdom's ways, and that Mrs. Dodge had likewise joined the Church, better at the lith hour than not at all. We have no settled Presbyterian Minister near to us than Tilsonburg which is about 15 miles, we go there sometimes to meeting, when the Sacrament is dispensed. We have Presbyterian meeting likewise at Vienna and Port Bulwill, but no settled minister. Vienna is about 8 miles and Port Burwell is about 11 miles, theme two places are supplied by the Presbytery. We are in hopes shortly to have a settled minister between these two places. We have a temperance hall in our Neighbourhood built by a society of the good templars, the members of that society have proposed to turn it into a meeting house, it is quite a respectable building, 30 ft. by 40, it is nicely plastered. I think it will be dedicated to the Presbyterian Church. My son, Albert, and I hold shares in the building, and there are more of the share-holders call themselves Prebyterians than there is of any other denomination, so that we live in hopes of having a supply of Presbyterian sermons shortly among us. The Methodists \_ 4 -

preach occasionally in our School-house, and we go to hear them but they are not very punctual to fulfil their appointments, and disappoint the people so that when they do come their congregation is very small. We keep up the good old practice of holding family worship every day, upon these occasions, I require some of the members of the family to read a portion of God's word with me. This practice I think has been a blessing to my family, it has not only had a good effect in teaching them to read but it has given them a knowledge of the Scriptures. Please write as soon as you receive this, let me know how your own family are getting along, and likewise how our brothers families are getting along. I received a letter from James last week in answer to one that I had written to him. He informed me how his own family were getting along, but did not say much about any of the rest of your families. I am sorry Sammy McKay left home in the way he did. I always thought him a fine promising boy. How is James Allison and his family getting along. I received 2 letters from him since I have been in Canada, give my respects to him when you see him, tell him I intend to renew our correspondence. Give our love to Grace and all the members of your family.

Letters from Scotland from the family of John Harvie (1730-1822), written to him in Nova Scotia, 1762—1819. There is also one letter written by John to his nephew Andrew Harvie, that was apparently never sent since it was found among the papers of John Harvie in Nova Scotia. In 1972 and 1977, the originals of these letters were in possession of Morley Harvey, Rural Route, Newport, Nova Scotia, and were examined by Elizabeth L. Nichols and Robert Paton Harvey, to clarify some questions from what was previously published. That was before the days of easy access to photocopiers, and only one letter was photocopied – and a copy of that original is included in the following pages. One thing that was clarified in the examination of the originals of various papers was the maiden surname of Janet, wife of Andrew Harvie, and mother of the emigrant John Harvie. The McLeod publication had listed it as Square... while an examination of the original clearly was Spare – which is correctly spelled *Speir*, as the parish records of Dalry, Ayr, Scotland confirms.

The letters were first published by McLeod Harvey, who died in 1946; there is no publication date on his pamphlet, but it was probably published in the 1940s. These letters were also reproduced in 1984 by Leland H Harvie in his Harvey/Harvie History (see under appreciation for more details on both publications).

However, since neither of these publications may be readily available to our present readership, these letters (or fragments thereof) are also included here. I have increased the number of paragraphs, to make it easier to follow the thoughts of the writer and made a few changes in spellings, but otherwise have used the previous publication of McLeod Harvey and copied the letters from there.

I have also added inserted information pertaining to what the writer of the letter was discussing, especially when John's brother Francis Harvie, is telling about the house he was in charge of building in 1781-1783. My brother, Kermit Bolton Nichols and his wife Lois of Raleigh North Carolina, were in Scotland in 1995-96 and found that house to be in process of being refurbished, and took pictures of it. I have included some pictures from those taken in 1996, with a quote from their letter to me at that time.

And I have bolded those references to John's mother, Janet Speir Harvieour ancestor. Elizabeth L. Nichols, August 2010, Salt Lake City, Utah, USA.

# **To Mr. John Harvie in Newport in Nova Scotia, New England** Dalry, [Scotland], August 7<sup>th</sup>, 1762

#### **Dear Brother**

This is to let you know that I received your letter dated Nov. 16<sup>th</sup>, 1761, about March last and was very glad to hear of your health and weelfare. I am very well at present and your mother and brothers and sisters. I wrote to you last summer and your brother Francis last winter which I expect you will have received and I have taken all opportunities to let you have word from us and desire that you would use the same diligence.

You wrote that have gotten a settlement on that country of Eight hundred acres of land. I wish you would send us a more distinct account what kind of land it is and whether it is wooding, Moorish, or laborious ground and after what way you have it, whether by tack or feu right and what you pay either in hand or yearly, and what kind of climat it is, whether hot or cold, and what kind of religion you have or none at all, and send word how you manage so much land for I think one hundred acres might serve you, and let me know what the principal grain is that your country abounds in.

You write to me to come to you and advise my brothers, but I cannot come nor advise any till I know better of the country and what we are to come too, but your mother still thinks you would have been better at your trade, since you had a way of living than going such hazards.

We have sent you a fuler account of friends and acquaintances in our last letters which I hope you have got, and so shall not stay on that now, nothing remarkable having happened. I have nothing further to mind at the time only I am glad to hear of our uncle's welfare and I want to be remembered to him and tell him to send a thou account f every one of his family and if his wife is alive or not, as he never speaks of her and tell him that the old Taylor is well and is now settle don farm at Lochmunnonch with his son Robert and that Mary is dead about Mar mass last and likewise let your uncle know that his son John is very well and is working his business at Greened Master and is very well and Captain Blair is very well pleased with him and refused to want him and swears that he is much better to work to him than go to his father and be scalped by the savage Indianans, he likewise tells him that you have nothing to live on in that country but Cabbage, Cale, and Potatoes, himself seems to be in a swithring of mind

whether to come or not, so with my best wishes for you and your prosperity and for you would mind the things that are of more consequence than the things of the world, I rest your loving brother, **James Harvie**.

Send a particular account of John Chalmer and John Orr if dead or alive for their friends are still enquiring at me about them and how they are faring

their friends are still enquiring at me about them and how they are faring. Send us work distinctly how to address our letters for you and be sure to send us true accounts and not lies and nonsence.

#### **Dear Brother:**

After may respeake to you and all friends I take this opertunitie to let you know that I and all your relatives hear are all wiel at present. Blessed be God for it. Hopeing this will find all your relation in the same. I received your letter dated June 8<sup>th</sup> 1781 and again I received your letter dated Halifax 11<sup>th</sup> Jan 1781 which I was glad to hear your weelfaier and your prosperity. I was glad to hear that the troublesome time has not come to your dors as yet which you ought to be thankful to God for it.

I take this opertunitie to let you know that our honoured mother is yet alive and is remarkebl fresh; she can come to Georges hous in Kilwinning on foot without being any the worse.\* James keps her aside him. She is a very old woman and wie ought to be in good earnest for her in her old age as she has been a doutiful mother to us.

[\*My brother, Kermit Bolton Nichols, walked that same road in 1995, when he was in Scotland. He said it was about 3 miles.]

James and his familie dos verie wel. Geen [Jean] and her two sons do verie weil. They are both married. At January last Andrew married Jeanet Daton a farmer's daughter. Thomas married Gean [Jean] Harvie in Brekenhjills. Mary and her famie dos wiel. Georg and his familie dos wiel and desires to be reckemended to all friends and purpickulairly to his father if alive.

I have to let you know the seat of my Familie. I have a hansom wife. She has born six sons as pritie boys as ever you set your eyes upon. Andrew the

John all alive – blessed be God for them.

Th's troubesm time is likely to stop all tread hear but I have reason to be thankful that I have as mouch ado as any of this pleas. I have a gentlemans hous to do in Dendonald. Mr. Alexander Farlie of Farlie, Esq\* which will take three thousand pounds sterling to finish it and I wrought the last year at it and th's year it will serve the next year too. I have contracted fro the finishing of the house; it is thought to be the best house in This country sid [side], I have 8 men and 2 sawers employed at present.

[\*This house was being refurbished in 1995-6 when Kermit Bolton and Lois (Drake) Nichols were in Scotland. Having read the above paragraph he reasoned that there should be some trace of the house yet and wrote

"It was not hard to find the house. It is still called the Fairlie House, although it now has a Kilmarnock address. It has recently been purchased by a Mr. Eric Montgomerie Mobey who is not only restoring the exterior painting and general repairs that all houses need but he is also refurnishing the entire house. He advised us that he had purchased it about a year ago from an elderly lady who had owned it for about twenty years and someone else had owned it before for about the same period of time. The thing that was so interesting to us was the generally good condition of the house – exterior and interior – such as doors, windows, door knobs, locks, etc.

"Mr. Mobey was most cordial and showed us through the entire house — all twenty-four rooms. We were able to tell him when the house was built (see excerpt of letter from Francis Harvie). His [Mr. Mobey's] information was around 1800. The specific information 1781-1783 was important to him as the house was supposedly designed by Robert Adams, the famous Scottish architect who also designed Culzean Castle. But if the house was built in the early 1800s that created a problem as Adams had died in 1796. The round rooms and the stairs are designed similar to Culzean Castle although nothing like as elaborate."] [See photos at the end of this letter.]

[returning to the letter Francis Harvie, brother to our ancestor John Harvie] Your Ounkel in Dilgarven and his Familie dos wiel. He has boult a new hous on the far end of the Cell ridge at the barn. Conserning your son I have spok to the Master of the grammar scholl. He thinks the money will do well



#### Dear Brother

This comes to let you know that I am in good health at present and I hope these few lines will find you in the same condition when they come to your hand. I would let you know that I received your letter dated the 19<sup>th</sup> of August 1783 at the first of May 1784. I was very glad to hear such news of your weelfare and that your children had got over the measles very easily and I likewise heard that your oldest daughter....

[here <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> page lost, McLeod Harvey says]

I will let you know that Cozen John Harvie is in good health at present and all his familie are. He is in very good circumstance in the world. He desires to be recommended to all friends, his father and brethren and sisters-and I want to hear from all our countrieman that went along with you as formerly for I heard that all went along with you is yet alive and in good circumstance save John Orr. We hear that you think he no more.

We hear from history the climate is very different from what is hear for we hear the winter is excessive cold and the summers exceedingly hot.

I trust you will let me know the truth of this in your next letter which you send to me and I hope you will write to me as frequently a possible and can have opportunities for I am at a loss sometimes to get opportunities to send to you. I hope you will take time to write all that ..... desired so I add no more.

From me James Harvie

My eldest son wrote this letter and the last likewise you know. I trust you will tell me in the next letter where to direct my letters which I sent to you.

If you want to know your mother's age she is just in her eighty-six year since the midst of March last this being the year 1784.

[then the same letter continues]

Although I have not money to buy land here it is so dear yet I might buy a little piece where you are for if I were to come to you I could not love to go there to sit down in a wilderness where there is no way of habitation at all......

And I hope you will let me know what sort of grain you have growing with you, if you have corn, beans, or pese, potatoes, or flax or what you do with flax whether you make cloth of flax or spin it in small yarn for selling. Now as I have asked several things at you which I hope you can and will answer in the next letter you send to me and likewise you will let me know how you are situate for hearing the Gospel and what kind of religion you have most with you and likewise if you are troubled with popery or prelacy in the place where you are and I trust you will let me know the same and you will let me know how we should purchase the ground which is full of woods and trees (a few words lost)....in buying unprepared land what sort of ground it is where you are whether mountainous or plain ground or good for grasing cattle for all our dependence for our rents in This place is in butter and cheese. I hope you will be very careful to write me an answer to these things and I hope if ever I come over to you, you will do all the industry you can make for us not to wrong yourself. You will likewise let me know how I will do with money in this countrie and the monie in your country how our money will answer in your place.

I desire to be recommended to all friends and relatives with you belonging to us so this is all at present.

Following are pictures taken in 1967 by Robert Paton Harvey when he was in Scotland. The information on the back of each picture (see page following the pictures) explains what each one is. They show the area of Dalry where the Harvie family lived, thus helping verify the validity of the information given in the letters from Scotland to Nova Scotia. Robert shared these pictures with Elizabeth Nichols in 1967, and since the copies I now had were not good enough to scan, Bob again kindly shared them for this publication. Here is the back of another one, that I did not include, but it refers to our



... from these letter to you of late but I suppose you have not received them as yu say you have received none this long time. I would be very glad to hear from you more frequent. You tell me your markets is very dear but ours is far dearer. Our cows selling at 6 to 20 pounds and horses from 20 to 50 pounds sterling and cheese at 9 shillings and upward per stone. Butter at one shilling the pound and meal at one shilling the peck and land is generally about one pound per acker of yearly rent which makes a high rent for a big farm but as markets are high people make a good way of living in general.

Your brother George is in the same farm that he was when I wrote you last and is in a better way of living than he was before, and his two sons namely Andrew and James.

And I have three sons myself namely Gavin, Robert, and James. My sons is not in such haste to be married as yours are. There is none of my sons married as yet and as I have had my farm these three years past in grass one of my sons is a wright and works at his trade and the other two is at service and if you send any encouragement to any of my sons for any of these occupations perhaps they will come over to you and you will be friend them and their uncle in doing what you can to procure them a place among the friends for a way of living through this world.

(a few lines lost)

John Chalmers thot all his friends is alive and well at present. You say that you hve not the Gospel in such plenty as you would wish which is a disadvantage to you. We have no need of such complaints. We have ministers of almost all sorts within a few miles of us which is a privilege beyond comparing. Our time is very alarming. There is an invasion from the French greatly feared which breeds a fear in the minds of our inhabitants and creates a stagnation of our trade. The which if these things take place they will bring this country to poverty and consternation.

I have not more particular to write to you but want you to write to me more frequent as I delight to hear from you. I hear of John Mackei a ship mate from Dalry to sail for Halifax and I send this letter by him. You will not neglect to tell me how I am to direct any letters as I have got no notice this

long time so I add no more at present but remain **your loving brother James Harvie in Newside Parish of Dalry.**

Kilwinning [Scotland], March 1st 1803

### Dear Brother.

I received yours of Dec. 25<sup>th</sup> 1802 and nothing gives me more pleasure than to hear of your and your family being all well and that Providence hath blessed you in the abundance of the good things of this life. I am happy to inform you that I and all the ot her members belonging to me are well at present, thanks be to God for his goodness in this respect, and I have no reason to complain with my situation. I am pretty comfortable at present.

Robert Harvie whom you so much lament was taken by the British Navie upon his return from you, and I have not heard from him these three years past.

With regard to my brother I never was anything obliged to him, but I have been obliged to my Cuzen John Harvie in a particular manner for his disinterested friendship. I have 2 son, Andrew and James. The elder Andrew is a stout man of 22 years and James a fine boy of 10 years.

My sister May is well and her daughter about to be married. My brother is dead and while he lived I never saw any of his letters which he received from you thro 13 years past. He has a son alive. I am happy to inform you that although he would never help your brother Francis widow, I have been enabled to be a good friend to her and I take a pleasure to relieve distressed virtue for which I never had occasion to rue.

I never expect to see yourself. I would wish to see one or more of your sons here that I might testifie my good will to them. Please be so good as write me as frequently as possible and send a little of your produce as a sample of your product that by the sample some of my sons or relations may be induced to come over to your country.

I reside in the Parish .... In a farm called the Gold Craigs where you may write to me, George Harvie, Gold Craigs to the care of Jas. Reid Merchant Kilwg. John Boag is still alive and has his compliments to you. I would like

to hear the rate of your cattle what horses and cows sell at with you. Horses and Kine is vastly high priced here these some years past horses from 20 to 50 pd. Draught horses per head, milch cows 10 to 20 pounds sterling. I sometimes deal a little in the horse line and I am pretty fortunate at some times.

I add no more but remain your **dear brother**. Yours affectionately, my wife and sons and all the rest of our Friends join along with me in our respect to you and your Family.

## **George Harvie**

To Mr. John Harvie, Newport, General Post Office, Haley Flax, Amerika **Dear Brother**.

I received yours of the deat of the 16<sup>th</sup> of June and come here the 18<sup>th</sup> of July. I was gleade to heare of your wellfeare, which gave great joy to me and all my family.

I am in good health; blest be God for it, my Family is doing very well and in a modreat state of living. Three them are mared. James is a Cartear, and has no children. Marget is mared and has one child. Jennet is marred and has one child, a daughter. Andrew is not mared but he is building a house this yeare twoe story hay [high] forty feet by eighteen.

I never hear wheater Marget our Cosne be daid or alaive; pleas when you write let me know. Your Anty Merrey and Family is all dead save a daughter and a sone maread [married] and doing modretealy. Jeaneat has a daughter mared to a dissenting minister in this place.

The contery [country] is greatly altered since you leaft this contrey; the ground is three times larger than when you was hear. My husbands father searched a peace of land about thirty yeare ago. I cold have foure times more this day if I plazed.

Brother James Family are all weall, but James the younger is deade and the other twoe ----- the other twoe are not mared but doing well. I hear that Andrew Geroge's sone I not liking the contry so well but if he chuss he may come home as heas mother greatly wishes him home to maneage the farme; there has ben a good sesen this years everything is lokeing well and a very promeseng Crope.


I was gld to heare that God has so far prosped you in a streng contry and given you a nombrose progey and a learge easteate as any of you kindred in this place. Your Uncle Robert Spare family is in a very proppearse way; the auldest son James has 10 ackers of Barley growen wich is allowed to be worth fifteen pounds per aker; heas brother John has so much improven the Newside farm whear our brother was that he could geat faife pounds for an acker to plowe for one year.

Therefor I greatly greatly desaire them to write me or any of my family. I shoed Thos. Aiken your leater and he was veary glad to see and promised to wreat you along with me and informe you of some of the country news. Dear Uncle.

I take this opportunity of informing you of my welafeare and all your relations as far as I know they are well, only James Harvie is dead. He was mared to a Merran Donald and in perfect health so far as known but in three weeks after mereg [marriage] he dead of about three days illness about the month of March.

Your Aunty L. Robert Barclay dyed of a short illness. Your brother Frances family is all well only William was meat of a vessel from Grenocke and was taken by the French in the month of March and in French jeale [jail] since. Robert is abord of Lord Nelsons fleet in pursuit of the French. Leas Steashon is a master meat. I am informed James family are all well and your sisters Marey is in good health and all her family. I save her leater for you.

Our markets are much the same as when I wrote last. We have an appearlane of an abundant harvest this year as everything lukes well. I was at George's weados [widow's] yesterday. Her otes is but very indefraud but her oter cropes lokes well. She wishes her son Andrew to come home as he has bein in the one of the plaster vessels he will have some knoleg of the sea, he may get into the guneated Steats and pass for an American sailor and so get hom eater being prised or taken by the French.

Yu speake that you think that Capn. John Leas bought the Acengree deare, but the country is greatly altered since you left it. Since I mind it was a good acker in land in Dalry parrish that would yealded six bouls otes but now it is nothen strenge to have fifteen bouls on the acker that was twenty faife pounds given for an acker of otes in the neboidhod of Dalry for one years Crope and in the bealage thear is twell dolors for one fall of ground.

I am informed that at Stevenson there was Coleng and everything is in conformetty. We have long threatened from the French of them coming to our cost ad we have bein always preparing for Ther veasel volentyers Malishe Levengmass and regular troupes so That we think we will geave them as sore drobing if ever They attem it.

Dear Uncle, when I reade your leaters and heare of your nombrose of spring and your large feterol estat it puts me in mind of the awld man I read of that went of from his own country and became a great and mighty people and heas neam was heald in everlasting Memory and Neashon blessed for heas sacke.

When writing to me let me know The name of the pleaces of Their abod. I desired to write Cosen Andrew but found that cold not git it don in time befor the vessel was to sale but you will please let Andrew see this leater. His mother had but very light cropes last years and this yeare is but midlong. Shee sold the twoe horses and bought antoher and sold also and won abut foure pounds. Her catell is all in a very Thraiving condishon and amongst a number of very helpful nehbors the Leard wuld have had her to give up the taske but shee wold notand is manaagen very well herself. She wishes Andrew home but you may let him know that if comes home he will have to be a volunture.

George Barcle is still swithering as formerly. James Allen is mared to Jean Ramsay and leaveing in the Bairell farme.

I could send a few pounds of Musten if I thought to geat a ready market for it or diferand artikels such as Clockes or watches, Nelfes or any theng that you stod in nead of and would take wood in return as you have plenty of wood growen. Let me know if you sell any of your wood ----- or what you do with it.

My family Andrew, Thos. Elisabeth and Jean and wife joyen with me and brother Andrew in siwhsing you long life and a hoapful deth is The ernest prear of your most afecnot **nephew**.

## Dear Uncle.

This come to let you know that I am in good health at present, blest be God for it; hoping this find you all in the same when it comes to hand.

I arrived safe at Salcoats the 4 of August; all had a fine passage of 38 days and we saw a man of war after we left the coast of America till we came to

the coast of Ireland. We saw one then but it was blowing very hard and they could not put out their boats and they let us pass and I was none sorry. We was boarded by the Halifax sloop of war one day after we left Pictou but they took none of our men as they were all hid but the boys and they consiner and myself. I dressed myself very well and the midshipman took no notice of me. I never was more scared in my life than on my passage but thank God I have got safe home.

There is a great many alterasions of This place since I went away. There is a large warf bulding at the Castel Crags this year and ½. They are going to make a small canal for small vessels to go to Glasgow. Our markets is now about the same as yours.

I was over at Dalry last Thursday. I saw your sister. She was spreading of hay. She is healthiest old woman. Your friend Mester Barcle is dead some years ago. There is a new melica to be lifted just now 6 thousand in Scotland, 8 in Ireland and 20 in England, and we will be plazed a great deal but I do not care as much as I did. The French and the Russings is about making peace and there is a war expected between us and the Americans but that you will now more of than me.

I have nothing more further to write to you now. You will remember me to all my friends in your country. You will writ to me The first opportunity. John Harvie says that he makes 6 per sent of his money out of his farm and 7 ½ is common interest. I take this opportunity of a vessel bound for Picton. I shall not trouble you any more at present but remen your humble servent

## **Dear Brother**

I take this opportunity of letting you hear how we are at present. I received your letter of date Nov. last and am very glade to hear of your welfare and that you are all in a prosperous condition.

As for myself I am not very well for some time past – But I am a good deal better at present. Thanks be to God.

As for Andrew, he is still far from being well; he complains greatly of a pain in his head—Some years ago he happened to get a blow on the head which we have some thoughts may be a cause of his trouble – Before that happened he was a most excellent workman, but now he cannot settle very well at his work – yet we must submit to Providence. Margaret and John Wilson are both very well and their daughter Mary – James and his wife are well and also Janet Fleming – and they still stay with me – Janet Houghton and her family are well and Elizabeth Hay is well so far as we know and her two sons James and Francis. Thomas Aitken and his family so far as we know. John Harvie in Achinques and his family are well. He has two daughters married and two sons unmarried.

Trade has been low this some months and the markets are lower. Meal is at 15d per peck, Butter 20d per lb. and cheese 11d ob.

I shall be glad to hear from you when you have opportunity. I shall not add any more but remain your very loving and affecionae sister, Mary Harvie

At Dalry [Scotland], April 12, 1819

### Dear Uncle.

This comes to let you know that I am in good health at present, hoping this will find you the same. I received a letter from you since one dated 28<sup>th</sup> Nov. 1817 to our Aunt Mary and I received one at the same time from Cousin James which told me that was in good health and in a comfortable

way of living. The which I was glad to hear of. You are an old man that has seen a great part of this world by what a great number have seen but what is all that to Eternity into which we must all shortly launch into. Our duty is now to prepare for it as we do not know at what hour our Lord doth come.

Your old friend the Laird of Broadlie is still alive and can walk to Dalry and his compliment to you. Your sister Mary is still alive and weel but very feble. Andrew is much the same as before. Her daughters lives both in her houses so that she has plenty of company. Your cousin John Harvie is alive and weel; his son Thomas has got a wife, one of our friends at Brakenhills near Bath and live in with his Father and his brother John all in one house. Your nephew James Harvie and Francis and their mother are all weel. Your nephew Andrew is married and ahs taken a farm but is too high a rent so that I doubt that he will be obliged to quit it to his loss which I am sorry for because he means to do weel and works very hard.

We had a fine crop last year and our oat Meal is selling at 1/6 per peck. Cheese at 3/4 per stone 24 oz to the pound. Beef 13/, Butter 1/8 per lb, pork 8 per lb. and other articles in proportion.

I wrote to you for a name. You said that I would soon get one. You can let me know. You can also let me know the state of your country. I am still working ahrd at slating houses and thatching and plasitering which is the most of my work. I sometimes make six and eight shillings per day and sometimes nothing but on the whole I make a good way of living. I have a hardware shope and my wife keep it and makes a little industry in that way so that we are very happy as we have no family.

My moher is alive and well and spins small yarn every day and lives in a room of my house and has plenty to live upon. Our manufacturing work is very low at this time and farmers are very much distressed with high costs. There is numbers failing every year which makes people at a stand which way to go. I add no more but be sure to write me the opportunity and I remain

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(Letter from John Harvie to Nephew, never sent – it was found in papers of John in Nova Scotia)

Newport, 17<sup>th</sup> July, 1819

Dear Andrew

I will let you know that I am in the land of the living and the place of hope. I am very feble but considerable helthy; Glory be to God. I received your letter the 1<sup>st</sup> July 1819. I wrote November 1817. I heard nothing till now. We are all comfortable and healthy. My Stephen's son John Harvie was buried the first of this month; sick about three weeks of a consumption; had a great property of money left to his relations.

[Comment from ELN: this "My Stephen's son John Harvie" who was buried in 1819 is apparently the John Harvie born 1793, son of Stephen Harvie (b 1774) and Katherine Mann; and was genetically the son of John's second wife Alice Wilcox and her first husband who was John's cousin, James Harvie.]

You know something of this country. It is not so good as when you was here. Our crops has failed this three years; the thistles are very thick, the winters are so long; people are obliged to work hard. Numbers of people coming from all parts have the most of them gone to the United States. One of Anthony's sons has gone to The Ohiho and is come home. I have not seen him since. My son James tells me he wants to go there to see that country. He things hard to raise a great family n this country where they must work so hard, so I think as you have a family you will never come here to work so hard as you must. The plaster is not good, five or six shillings per ton. Andrew hauls a great deal of flour. There is a great many breaking and going out of the country for debt.

Dear Andrew I am very sorry that I could not use you so well as I would wish, that is to stay at home with me, but you was to go amongst strangers. My Stephen was not willing to give you his place and we had not work enough for you both. I thought it hard. There is such hard winters here we

are obliged to work hard to make a living. George has two sons and two daughters. Woodbary married Georges wife's sister last spring and in a comfortable way of living. You may send me a letter as I want to hear from you and my nephews Aikens family. As they went that way gave up all the right and title you have to that as it is subject to be escheated. The Governor wants the land settled and as there is always some people looking for land so I could take possession of it as my folks is not wiling to anything as it stands now. This is all from your old feble Uncle

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


A drawing of Margaret Harvie




### John Harvie lived at Highless, Dalry, Ayrshire, Scotland and later at Avondale, Nova

Scotia. One correspondent in a letter to ELN described Dalry as "a grubby little town but the countryside around the town is most beautiful and very much like it is at Newport, Nova Scotia." She further wrote "The first settling place of the Harvie's in Nova Scotia was Avondale. The modern name for Avondale is Newport Landing. Where the paved road ends at Newport Landing is almost where Avondale Cemetery is and "Roseway" House stands, now owned by Roland Parker (in 1966). "Roseway" is the name of farm where John and Experience Harvie built their house."

The christening entry in Dalry, Ayr, Scotland reads: "Andrew Harvie of Highlees had a lawful son John baptized, May 1730." His brother's chr gives more details: Scottish Church Records on CD –chr James Harvie, son of Andrew Harvie and Janet Speir, chr 17 mar 1728 at Kilbirnie, Ayr, Scotland, Batch C115962, source film 1041381, frame 53, dates 1688-1820; also International Genealogical Index (IGI) Batch C115962, Also: Andrew Harvey in Highlees had a lawful son called Francis baptized 13 Dec 1741; and Dalry parish register, p 54 1744: Janet Speir, relict of Andrew Harvie in Highlees, had their posthumous son called George born June 28th (or 25th) & baptized July 1st. Also remember that-Janet named her first son Robert Harvie, chr 22 May 1726, in Dalry, Ary, Scotland, of Highlees.

The above gives us the son John; the identity of the son Robert comes from the letter written to John Harvie in Nova Scotia from his sister Mary Harvie (her married name) in 1807, where she refers to John's Uncle Robert Spare. (see page\_\_\_\_.)

Benjamin's brother, Stephen Wilcox was born abt 1717 in Rhode Island, and died there in 1788, Had a will which left his property to his brothers; William, Benjamin, Smiton and Thomas; "what shall remain after my wife, Mary is no longer my widow".
