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DAUGHTERS OF "LITTLE" ARCH HARVIE

In the will of Noah Anthony proved in 1844 (Hants Co. Court of Probate, Estate No. 444A) reference is made to the children of his late daughter Ruth. Only one daughter was previously identified as the issue of 151-Archibald Harvie and Ruth Anthony; Sarah born ca. 1823, but thanks to Alex Farquhar of Liverpool who provided the

following letter, we now know that there were a total of 8 daughters by this marriage.

Mary Cordelia Harvie was born in Stanley (Mosherville). She was the daughter of Archibald (Little Arch) Harvie and her mother was Ruth Anthony (they were 1st cousins) Ruth was the daughter of Noah and Agnes (Harvie) Anthony. Ruth Anthony's father had a large property between Mosherville and Stanley. Ruth and "Little Archie" had 8 daughters (named above).

Lydia, born 1821 (no information)

Sarah, born 1823 married James Harvie. They lived in Scotch Village. One of their children was Benson Harvie who used to visit in Burntcoat.

Rachael married Gavin Harvie. They moved to Ontario.

Amy Agnes, (no information)

Eliza, "

Ruth, "

Phoebe, "

Mary Cordelia born 1835, died 31 Jan 1918 at the home of her oldest daughter (Phoebe (Brown) Dimock of Newport Hants Co.

She was an infant when her mother died. I wonder who took care of her as her oldest sister would be only 13 years old.

The mother of these girls (Ruth (Anthony) Harvie) died in April 1836 in childbirth or a short time later at the Anthony home in Stanley and Mary Cordelia was born there. It would seem Ruth journeyed from North Noel Road to have her baby and died there. Now, Little Archie had 8 girls on his hands. Then he married Elizabeth Miller and

they had 12 children, namely James Edward, George A., Joseph M., Robert, Thomas, John William, Joel D., Sophia, Janie, Sylvanus, Mahala and Katherine. There were a couple of sets of twins among them.

Some of these names strike a memory chord with me. They would be uncles and aunts of our father (John William Brown Jr.)

So "Little Archie" apparently was the father of 20 children in all. He certainly helped to provide lots of Harvies. He was born in 1796 and died in 1884."

DROWNED AT SHIPYARD

Bridgeport Morning Telegram-Union, Monday, 10 June 1901.

In Aug 1991, I obtained a copy of the death certificate for 1541-Robert Archibald Harvie at the office of the Department of Health Services in Hartford, Connecticut and subsequently found this newspaper account in the State Library.

Robert A. Harvey, a ship carpenter in the employ of Greene Bros. in the shipyard in East End was drowned Saturday afternoon about 4 o'clock while at work on the menhaden steamer Acushnet. He came to this city from Nova Scotia, and was a man who never drank intoxicating liquor.

Harvey was engaged on the hull of the steamer and had been working on a float. It is surmised that he climbed the ladder from the float to the deck of the boat and in returning to the float slipped, striking his head. The blow probably stunned him and when he fell in the water he drowned before recovering his senses sufficiently to make an attempt to save himself.

It was about half an hour before he was missed, no employees being at work near him. A search of the yard was made and then it dawned upon those in search of him that he might have been drowned. Grapples were procured and the bottom dragged. Capt. Wilson of the tug William which is on the ways succeeded in grasping Harvey's clothing and brought the inanimate form to the surface. The body was laid on the dock until Medical Examiner F. D. Downs was communicated with and give permission for its removal to the morgue.

From the marks on the head and face the theory that he struck his head in falling

would seem to be verified. Dr. Downs gave a certificate of death due to drowning. Relatives of the deceased in Nova Scotia were communicated with, but last night no reply had been received. Besides a gold watch Harvey had a fair size roll of bills on his person at the time of the accident. He boarded at 16 Seaview avenue.

SEVEN BODIES RECOVERED AFTER NORTH BARRINGTON STREET BLAZE - EXTRA - HUNT FOR VICTIMS AS FOUR HOUSES SWEEPED BY FLAMES.

The lone survivor of two families, now on the Victoria General Hospital danger list suffering "very extensive burns", offers the one hope for a positive answer to the cause of a disastrous fire which swept a row of north Barrington Street tenements yesterday morning bringing death to eight occupants, and causing damage estimated at \$25,000.

Robert Harvey, whose wife and four children died in their beds was rushed to hospital after he fled from the blazing building clad only in his underclothing.

The blaze took the lives of three members of another family living on the second floor of the same building. The dead are: Mrs Robert Harvey and sons David, George, Sheldon and Kenneth all below school age. Mr and Mrs. Patrick Furlong and young son Stephen.

Over a dozen families in the four tenements and nearby buildings fled lightly dressed into the early morning cold until they found shelter in a Barrington Street taxi office.

Any information that would help to identify this stray branch of the family would be most welcome.

Summerville history recalled through Stuart Harvie autobiography

"My early life in Summerville" is an excerpt from an autobiography written by the late Stuart Harvie of Toronto in May, 1979. Stuart died in Toronto on October 7, 1985. His boyhood was spent on the old Grant farm on Loyal Hill in Summerville. Born in Avondale, he moved to Summerville with his parents when he was seven or eight years old. Loyal Hill Farm at that time was owned by Stuart's uncle, Alfred Stuart Cochrane. The boy's parents were Weston Harvie and Ala (Cochrane) Harvie.

This was years before I myself lived on Loyal Hill Farm, but his descriptions of the view and the "traffic" on the Avon River in those days must certainly revive memories to older people on the Shore.

He writes:

"One aspect of this farm that always remains as a beautiful memory is its situation on top of high land with an unlimited view. From the kitchen window (south) there was an unobstructed view of the Avon River with Horton Bluff and its lighthouse in the background. Turn to another kitchen window (west) and you could see the whole scope of Minas Basin with Cape Blomidon, and also Boot Island and the estuary of the Cornwallis River.

In those days there was quite a bit of traffic on the Avon river, schooners and the occasional tramp steamer en route upriver to Windsor to load lumber for overseas. But the most interesting was the traffic in gypsum between ports at the head of the river to New York or, more specifically, to Staten Island. It was always of community interest when the tugboat Gypsum King showed up towing two, usually three empty barges, and anchored off Horton Bluff. She was a large sea-going tug built along the lines of Foundation Franklyn that performed such noble service in rescue and salvage operations off Halifax in more recent years. The King had a whistle like a foghorn. Indeed, it was a foghorn.

"Soon as the tug anchored the barges, there would be four resounding blasts on the horn and she would go full speed to the government dock at Summerville where the Captain, Alonzo Coburn, would head for his home a short distance away to visit his family for a few hours or perhaps for the duration of another tide. It was almost a ritual. And there is a sequel to it.

One year, 1918, the tug came in without fanfare, the barges anchored, and with the flag flying at half-mast, the King moved slowly to the pier and landed the body of her commander wrapped in a shroud. He had died of the influenza on the way from New York. The whole community suffered with his family."

Stuart Harvie states that in Avondale school he had not been happy but that things changed when he attended school in Summerville.

During his first years his teacher had been Luella MacRae from Grand Pre. He wrote of her as "not only a fine lady but an excellent teacher, who always found time to help individual pupils who needed help." She always held spelling bees, he wrote, and he remembered once winning one of these contests by correctly spelling "asafoetidae." Miss MacRae finally married Stuart's cousin Leroy P. Sanford and raised a family in Summerville.

Another teacher whom he wrote of as being "worthy of note" was Rosie Rines from Freeport, Digby County, who taught in the higher grades. He said she had a good sense of humor and could always join in with the students in a good laugh when occasion arose. But she could be strict too when needed; the strap was used frequently and effectively. Stuart admits he was not exactly a model student and as a result he got the expected retribution. If he reported such an incident at home, he usually got the curt comment from his father that he'd probably deserved it.

"They were a good bunch in that school," he wrote. They played baseball in good weather, and in winter there was skating on the old quarry where high banks protected them from the wind. In the middle of the old quarry was a pond with a little island where they built their bonfires.

His father had twinges of inflammatory rheumatism almost from their coming to Loyal Hill, he wrote. Stuart gradually took over the farm work, mowing with a scythe, chopping wood in the pasture, slaughtering beef animals, helping heifers with difficult births, gardening. He took lessons on the reed organ, later on the piano and became proficient.

Dr. Annie Hennigar was a frequent visitor at Loyal Hill Farm. She drove a coal-black stallion named "Monteith" - Monty for short, and Stuart had to stable him and was half scared of him, but, he wrote, "Dr. Annie slapped him round like a colt and the horse liked it."

Stuart caught a bad cold acting as pall bearer at the funeral of a schoolmate from Riverside, Thelma Sanford, who died of tuberculosis, and he developed pneumonia. He said the village of Riverside was snowbound and the coffin had to be taken to the "remote" graveyard on a bob-sled behind a team of horses, with the mourners walking. It had been a cold day and all of them became thoroughly chilled.

In 1914, Stuart's father arranged passage for him on the Canada, then a gypsum barge, to New York to visit a friend of the family who was to take Stuart to a clinic for examination for ear trouble. "For all the good it did," he wrote, "I might as well have stayed on the farm, but that didn't deter me from enjoying a delightful and educational trip."

Shortly after his return he realized his father was growing worse. The boy was faced with a decision: Should he stay on the farm or make other plans for the future? He discussed it with his parents and they gave him good advice but left the final decision to him. That winter, 1914-15, he spent working on the farm and in his free time he walked through the woodlands with his dog and with his gun over his shoulder. Realizing that farming was a lot of hard work for low pay he finally decided to go in search of a job and his parents decided to soon move away from the farm.

That summer, working in Windsor, Stuart had a serious illness, which appears to have been rheumatic fever, and his family moved off the farm for good.

Stuart worked for Andre Peter Shand. That fall he had an offer from John Malcolm MacDonald, Station Master, to work as clerk in the Windsor Railway Station.

This was the beginning of his life-work, for he worked for the Railroad for almost 50 years, first at Windsor, later at Kentville. He started out at \$30 a month in 1916. The next year, he wrote, was confusion. War was raging. Business was booming but facilities for handling freight in Windsor were non-existent because of damage caused by fire. They used Akin's large warehouse, rebuilt in a year. Later in 1918, by then in the Valley, Stuart was attacked by a vicious dog that jumped, he said, for his throat, missed his jugular vein but tore away the lower part of his face. He was on duty at the depot when it happened. He went to nearby house and washed in a creolin solution then on to Kentville where he finally found a doctor, where he got 18 stitches without anesthetic. Then he went home on the train.

Posted back to Windsor at a higher salary, he was sent in 1925 to Boston City Ticket Office. He regreted not being able to fight in either war, as he had by now learned the Morse Code. Later he married to Gertrude Amelia Robinson.
